Adjour Oxford Street Hearing Until July 31
Residents of Oxford Street were notified, when they appeared before the Board of Public Works, that the public hearing on the black topping of the street set for July 24 had been adjourned to Tuesday, July 31, at 8:00 p.m.

Ernest Blanchard, Township Supervisor, stated that the hearing was being adjourned one week and would be held along with the opening of sealed bids on the extension of the Woodbine Subdivision Water System, also set for July 31. The Supervisor stated that the approval for the sale of bonds for the Woodbine Water System was not granted by the Michigan Finance Commission in time for legal publication and the necessary voting period, so as to be held on July 24.

Residents stated that they had not been notified by the Board that the meeting was to be adjourned either by publication or posted notice. The Enterprise did not learn until Monday evening, July 23, that the Tuesday meeting was to be adjourned.

Under the proposal Oxford Street is to be graded, black-topped and curbs set. That section of the street between Grand River and Shawwassee Street. The entire cost of the project is to be borne by the property owners affected and paid on a special assessment basis.

TOWNSHIP BOARD FORMALLY OK'S NEW FIRE HALL SITE

The Farmington Township Board has selected Bell's Garage on Northwestern Highway near 14 Mile Road as the site for one of two new fire stations to be located in Farmington Township, Ernest Blanchard, Township Supervisor, announced this week.

Approval was given to the site provided that a volunteer fire department could be recruited from residents of the area. Thomas Turley and Ward Eagle, Justices of the Peace, and members of the Farmington Township Board were directed to proceed with the recruiting for the volunteer force. Turley stated that a meeting will be called in the next week or ten days to organize the volunteer force.

The new bus is painted a bright yellow, the color recently authorized by the State Legislature for school buses. This is the first new color. It was a carry the Legislature upon the recommendation of the National Safety Council and police authorities. The bright yellow color, however, seen according to the Council, and is in more common use throughout the other states. The other buses will continue to carry the red, white and blue color until they need repainting.

School officials stated that the purchase of the new bus is a direct result of the recent millage increase approved by the voters. Approval has been granted to the Farmington Township School District for the sale of the first series of \$300,000 worth of bonds for the construction of new school buildings. It was announced Wednesday by Superintendent O. E. Dunche.

Dunche made the announcement following notification from the Michigan Finance Commission in Lansing. The Commission granted permission for the sale of the bonds at their regular meeting Tuesday morning. The approval by the Commission clears the way for the advertising of bids on the sale of the bonds.

Plans details of the sale of the bonds are expected to be completed at the next regular meeting of the board, to be held August 13. Several formal resolutions upon the sale of the bonds will be passed by the Board before bids can be secured. The sale of the first series of \$300,000 worth of bonds is the initial step towards the completion of the program.
