ington, the only Universalist performer who was available to perform weddings and conduct funeral services here — an occasionally to speaker — was Dr. Lee S. McColester. This condition prevailed until 1920.

For some 25 years Dr. McColester was minister of the Detroit church, which stood on "Pleasant Hill", fronting Grand Circus Park, the present site of the Hotel Park.

He was a tall, dignified, reserved man, a scholarly and urbane speaker, who on resigning in Detroit became dean of the School of Religion at Tufts College, Boston.

Some of his trips to Farmington might almost be classed as ordeals. He recounted that on one mid-winter night, probably in the 1870s, he rode a street car to the end of the line at Grand River Avenue and West Grand Boulevard and was met there by a party of Farmington churchmen in a hobbles.

Swathed in blankets they kept their feet as close as possible to lanterns on the floor of the sled throughout the long westward journey.

Dr. McColester's successors in Detroit, the handsome Rev. Willis A. Moore and later the Rev. Charles Patterson, also spoke in Farmington.

In November 1920 the church engaged the Rev. Anthony B. Beresford, D.D., of Cincinnati, as minister. While he was pastor the manse was built on the western side of the church lot. In 1921 the church received a pulpit as a gift of the Plymouth congregation.

Dr. Beresford, a heavy-set man of medium height, was a grandiloquent speaker. His sermons were impromptu because he was nearly blind. Before he resigned in 1925 he had lost his eyesight.

In November 1928 the church observed its 75th anniversary.

Scald Vegetables Before Freezing

Vegetables to be frozen need to be scalded to keep them from spoiling, says Annabell C. Jubb, Michigan State College foods and nutrition specialist.

She pointed out that the scalding liquid makes harmless the enzyme systems which bring about maturity and later decay. Freezing and holding the vegetables at low temperatures will delay spoiling, but will not prevent it without the scalding step.
