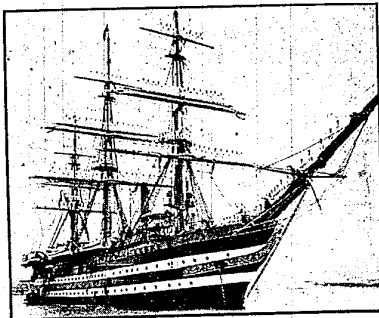
CHILDREN NEED REGULAR MEALS DURING SUMMER

Your growing children should eat regular meals during the summer months, but it's sometimes a problem to get them to stop being "too busy playing" to eat.

Foods and nutrition specialists at Michigan State College have a couple of hints that they hope will help make the job easier. They say that getting children to eat the basic seven foods is easy when meals are served regularly.

Regular mealtimes will help prevent the formation of the "munching" habit. Nibbling on sweets may temporarily satisfy hunger, but it does not satisfy the body's need for nourishing food, they remind mothers.

"If your child needs a between-meal snack, make it a point to serve some of the basic seven foods as part of their daily diet. A small glass of fruit juice, fresh fruit, milk, a crisp vegetable or bread and butter are ideas for snacks," the MSC specialists remind.

Minutes of Regular Meeting held July 16, 1951, and Special Meeting held July 30, 1951, were read and approved.

Motion made by Conroy and supported by Cavanaugh that the following amended resolution be adopted:
BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, that the said City shall on or before December 1, 1952, submit to the Michigan Department of Health and Water Resources Commission of the State of Michigan, definite plans and specifications for the construction of a plant or other means satisfactory to the Michigan Department of Health and the Water Resources Commission for the disposal of the sewage of said City.

And be it further resolved by the Council that said City shall on or before the date above mentioned also submit to said Michigan Department of Health and the Water Resources Commission plans and proposals as to how said City proposes to finance the construction of said sewage disposal facilities.

Be it further resolved that said City of Farmington shall take the necessary action to complete the construction of said necessary sewage disposal facilities on or before December 1, 1953.

Motion carried, all yeas.

Motion made by Nourjian and supported by Conroy to adopt the following resolution:

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, as follows:

WHEREAS, on May 9, 1951, a Resolution was passed and adopted by the Commission of said City of Farmington to condemn certain premises located within said City described as:

A. Lot 19 of Perkins and Cowan's Subdivision, and
B. Lot 29 of Perkins and Cowan's Subdivision,

and authorized the City Attorney to institute proper proceedings in accordance with said Resolution, and

WHEREAS, said attorney has filed in the Circuit Court for Oakland County, Michigan, a petition on behalf of said City for the condemnation of said premises; and

WHEREAS, the owners of said premises have expressed a willingness to convey said premises to the City, providing the City is willing to pay a reasonable price therefor.

NOW THEREFORE, be it now resolved that the City Attorney be and he is hereby authorized to negotiate with the owners of said premises and receive from said owners their lowest asking price in writing; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that on receiving such offer said attorney submit the same for consideration and approval of this Council.

Motion Carried, all yeas.

Motion made by Cavanaugh and supported by Nourjian that the following resolution be adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, that the following Schedules attached to and a part of Ordinance No. C-23-48 of said City, known as the Traffic Ordinance, be and is hereby amended and supplemented as follows:

There shall be added to Schedule I, "No Parking At Any Time" the following sections:

8. On the north side of Grand River Avenue between the easterly line of the City Limits and the westerly line of the City Limits, except franchised buses at designated "Bus Stops".

9. On the South side of Grand River Avenue between the entrance to the driveway to City owned parking lot to the westerly line of the City Limits.

Sections 3 and 5 of Schedule I are repealed.

Section 1 to 4, inclusive, and Section 7 shall continue to remain in full force and effect.

Schedule II, Sections 3 and 4 are hereby repealed.

Sections 1 and 2 shall remain in full force and effect.

Schedule III, One Hour Parking.

Section I is hereby amended to read as follows:
1. On the south side of Grand River from the entrance to the drive way to the City owned Parking Lot east to Orchard Street, except franchised buses at designated "Bus Stops".
Sections 2 and 3 shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 4 is hereby repealed.

Schedule IV, Two Hour Parking.

Section 1 is hereby amended to read as follows:
1. On the south side of Grand River (U.S. 16) between Orchard Street to Powers.

Motion carried, all yeas.

Motion made by Miller and supported by Conroy that bills presented for the month of July, 1951, be paid.

Roll Call: Cavanaugh, Conroy, Loomis, Nourjian, Miller. Carried, all yeas.

Motion made by Miller and supported by Conroy that Mr. Litch be authorized to contract with the Standard Oil Company for the installation of a gasoline pump. Motion carried, all yeas.

Motion made by Nourjian and supported by Cavanaugh to adjourn. Motion carried.

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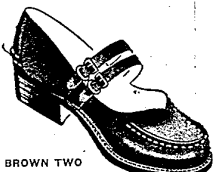
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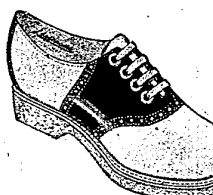

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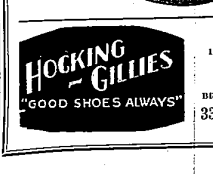

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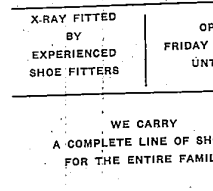
Plain Moccasin Toe or Perforated Vamp.
