Issue More Fishing Licenses This Year Over 31,000 more fishing licenses have been issued through August this year than in the comparable eight-month 1950 period, the conservation department discloses. License agent reports to September 1 show \$35,320 permits picked up by anglers while in the same period last year \$64,279 were purchased. Resident licenses total 673,071 or nearly four per cent more than the 649,628 reported sold by license dealers through August, 1950.

PREDICT HUNTING ACCIDENTS TO CLAIM 28

Close to 28 persons will die and another 150 will be injured if this season's hunting accident pattern follows the average of the last ten years.

The fact that only a relatively few . . . 215 out of 1,032,000 licensed hunters are casualties last fall and winter is of no consolation to the victims.

How will the casualties occur? Past hunting accident investigations indicate many of them will be caused by: careless loading and unloading of the firearm in the presence of other hunters, a hunter's unexpectedly moving in the line of fire, and tripping or falling while walking along or crossing a fence or other obstacle.

Considering all types of firearm mishaps, the hunter's greatest danger will be the gun of a member of his own hunting party or his own gun. Hunting accident reports reveal that in practically all cases the hunter shoots another hunter or himself; rarely is a non-hunter a victim.

Establish New Elm, Oak Wilt Disease Laboratory

According to C. A. Boyer, Chief of the Bureau of Plant Industry of Michigan Department of Agriculture, much has been said regarding the control of the Dutch elm disease that has been deterring in certain areas of the country. It has its appearance in Michigan during August of 1950.

In the past all cultural and diagnostic work for the detection of this disease has been done at the U. S. D. A. laboratory, East Orange, New Jersey. That laboratory closed for this type of work at the end of September, 1951. As a result it became necessary for Michigan to carry on the work. Necessary arrangements have been made with officials at Michigan State College where a laboratory is now being set up with the cultural and diagnostic work to be under the supervision of Forrest Strong, pathologist, botany department, Michigan State College, East Lansing.

All cooperating personnel working on Dutch elm disease and oak wilt who wish to have laboratory analysis made of suspicious material should mail specimens direct to Professor Strong or C. A. Boyer.
