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RED CROSS TO AID GROUPS STORE BLOOD FOR FUTURE

A storehouse of blood as insurance against future transfusions may now be accumulated by communities, organized groups or individuals. According to an announcement by the Oakland County Chapter of the American Red Cross, this new program is to be launched as an auxiliary to the military and civilian blood banks now in effect.

Any group or individual wishing to build up a blood credit may call upon a Red Cross blood mobile unit providing 250 confirmed donors and space with the equivalent of 1500 square feet for the blood bank are made available.

This system allows the group to designate the percentage of blood collections to go to the military and how much to be established at a chosen hospital as a bank for future use. A blood chairman appointed by the group may "write a check" for blood in any case authorized by the group. Individuals may also build up a credit for future transfusions.
