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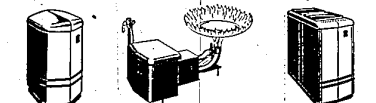
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WEST POINT PARK

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AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE NO. C-23-48 KNOWN AS TRAFFIC ORDINANCE BY ADDING A NEW SCHEDULE THEREIN RELATING TO LEFT TURNS

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

1. That Ordinance No. C-23-48 be and the same is hereby amended by the addition of a new schedule thereto, to read as follows:

SCHEDULE XI
NO LEFT TURNS AT ANY TIME IN THE FOLLOWING DESIGNATED AREAS

1. No vehicle shall make a left hand turn off Grand River for the purpose of entering the driveway between Grand River Street numbers 33245 and 33265.

2. No vehicle entering into Grand River from the driveway between Grand River Street numbers 33245 and 33265 shall make a left hand turn upon entering into Grand River Avenue.

PAID VIOLATION BUREAU IN LIEU OF COURT ACTION" be and the same is hereby revised by the addition of a new provision to read as follows:

"Making a Prohibited Left Turn \$3.00."

3. That Schedule X of Ordinance No. C-23-48, "AMOUNT TO BE PAID VIOLATION BUREAU IN LIEU OF COURT ACTION" be and the same is hereby revised by the addition of a new provision to read as follows:

4. This amendment to Ordinance No. C-23-48 by addition of Schedule XI thereto and the addition to Schedule X thereof shall become effective November 15, 1951.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE NO. C-23-48, KNOWN AS "TRAFFIC ORDINANCE", TO PROVIDE FOR THE INSTALLATION, REGULATION AND CONTROL OF THE USE OF PARKING METERS AND PARKING METER ZONES; DEFINING PARKING METER ZONES; AUTHORIZING A METHOD OF PAYMENT FOR PARKING METERS AND THE INSTALLATION THEREOF; EXCLUSIVELY FROM RECEIPT OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON; PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT AND PENALTY FOR VIOLATION THEREOF AND PROVIDING THAT INVALIDITY OF PART SHALL NOT AFFECT THE VALIDITY OF REMAINDER

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

That Ordinance No. C-23-48 be and the same is hereby amended, in accordance with the above subject matter by the addition of a new article thereto to be known as Article XVIII to read as follows:

SECTION 89. VEHICLE. Every device in, upon or by which any person or property is or may be transported or drawn upon a street or highway.

SECTION 90. The following described streets in the City of Farmington are hereby designated and established as parking meter zones, to wit: All those streets and parts of streets upon which limited parking is now and/or may hereafter be permitted under authority and by virtue of all limited parking ordinances now and/or hereafter effective, and the parking limits and restrictions now and/or hereafter therein provided are hereby incorporated in this article for all uses and purposes applicable to the conditions, terms, and enforcement hereof.

The number of parking meters to be installed and the locations thereof shall be selected by the City Manager by and with the advice of the Chief of Police.

SECTION 91. The City Manager shall provide for installation of meters, including curb or street marking lines, regulation and operation thereof, and shall cause said meters to be maintained in good workable condition. Meters shall be placed upon the curb next to individual parking spaces and meters shall be so constructed as to display a signal showing legal parking upon deposit therein of the proper coin, or coins, of the United States as indicated by instructions on said meter, and for a period of time conforming to the parking limits of the City of Farmington, said signal to remain in evidence until expiration of said parking period so designated, at which time a change of signal or some other mechanical operation shall indicate expiration of said parking period.

SECTION 92. The City is hereby vested with the authority to enter into a contract for the purchase and installation of parking meters and to provide payment therefor exclusively from the receipts obtained by the City from their operation and that said means of payment shall be in addition to any other purchasing power heretofore granted the City by its charter, or by the laws of the State of Michigan.

SECTION 93. When any vehicle shall be parked next to a parking meter the owner or operator of said vehicle shall park within the area designated by the curb or street marking lines as indicated for parallel or diagonal parking and upon entering said parking space shall immediately deposit in said meter one or more five cent coins of the United States, and/or one or more one cent coins of the United States as indicated by instructions on said meter. It shall be unlawful for any person to fail to park within said designated area, or fail or neglect to so deposit the proper coin, or coins.

Said parking space may then be used by such vehicle during the legal parking limit provided by the ordinances of the City, and said vehicle shall be considered as unlawfully parked if it remains in said

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space beyond the legal parking limit and/or when said parking meter displays a signal showing such illegal parking.

It shall be unlawful for any person to cause or permit any vehicle registered in his name to be unlawfully parked as set out in this section.

SECTION 94. It shall be unlawful for any person to deposit, or cause to be deposited in a parking meter one or more five cent coins and/or one or more one cent coins for the purpose of extending the parking time beyond the maximum time fixed by the ordinance of the City of Farmington.

SECTION 95. It shall be unlawful to deposit or cause to be deposited in any parking meter, any slug, device or a metallic substitute for a coin of the United States.

SECTION 96. It shall be unlawful for any person to tamper with, open, willfully break or destroy any parking meter.

SECTION 97. CITATION TAGS. The Chief of Police is hereby authorized and directed to supply police officers with citation tags for the purpose of giving notices to persons violating any provisions of this ordinance. Such notice may be given by delivering such tag to the violator or by affixing it to the vehicle by means of which the violation occurred. Such citation tag shall direct the violator to appear and to present such tag at a designated place on or before a date and hour specified thereon. Nothing in this section shall be construed to abridge the power of a police officer to arrest any violator and take him into custody.

SECTION 98. PROCEDURE FOR TACKLING VEHICLES. Whenever any motor vehicle without a driver is found parked or stopped in violation of any of the restrictions imposed by this ordinance, the officer finding such vehicle shall take its registration number and may take any other information displayed on the vehicle which may identify its user, and shall conspicuously affix to such vehicle a notice in writing on a form provided by the City for the driver to answer to the charge against him within seven (7) days at the time and place specified in the notice. The officer shall deliver copies of such notice to the Traffic Violations Bureau.

SECTION 99. All provisions of Article XIV of said Ordinance No. C-23-48 are hereby declared to be part of and shall be construed as applicable to this article hereby added to said "Traffic Ordinance". It shall be the duty of all police officers and they are hereby authorized and empowered, in the enforcement of this article, to comply with all provisions and procedure contained in Article XIV of said ordinance, and in the article herein enacted.

SECTION 100. PROCEDURE FOR IMPOUNDMENT OF VEHICLE. Any police officer may impound any motor vehicle parked at a place where parking is prohibited by this ordinance, or which has been parked for more than one hour in excess of the time allowed for parking in any place, or which has been involved in two or more violations of this ordinance, for which citation tags have been issued and not presented as required herein. Any person desiring to redeem such impounded vehicle shall first pay such fine or fines as may be assessed by the Judge of the Municipal Court for the violation or violations for which such motor vehicle was impounded, PROVIDED, that such fine or fines shall not exceed Five (\$5.00) Dollars and Five (\$5.00) Dollars costs for each such offense.

SECTION 101. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate or permit or allow any one to violate SECTION 93 or SECTION 94 of Article XVIII of this Ordinance, shall upon conviction be fined not more than Two (\$2.00) Dollars.

SECTION 102. Any person who shall violate or assist in the violation of Section 95 of Article XVIII of this Ordinance shall upon conviction be fined not more than Ten (\$10.00) Dollars or by imprisonment in the County Jail for a period of not more than fifteen (15) days or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court.

SECTION 103. Any person who shall violate or assist in the violation of Section 96 of Article XVIII of this Ordinance shall upon conviction be fined not more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars or by imprisonment in the County Jail for a period of not more than thirty (30) days or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

SECTION 104. The fee required to be deposited in said meter is hereby levied as a police regulation and inspection fee to cover the cost of providing parking spaces, parking meters, installation, and maintenance thereof, the cost of regulation and inspection, operation control and use of the parking meter spaces and zones created herein, for the regulation and control of traffic moving in and out of, and parking in, said parking spaces and zones so created, and for the cost of any resultant traffic administration expense.

SECTION 105. If any section, provision or part of this article shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional by a Court of competent jurisdiction, then such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the article as a whole, or any section, provision or part thereof not so adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 106. This amendment shall take effect November 15th, A. D. 1951.

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
