Indiana will have its first open deer season on November 1 to 3, limited to certain southern counties.

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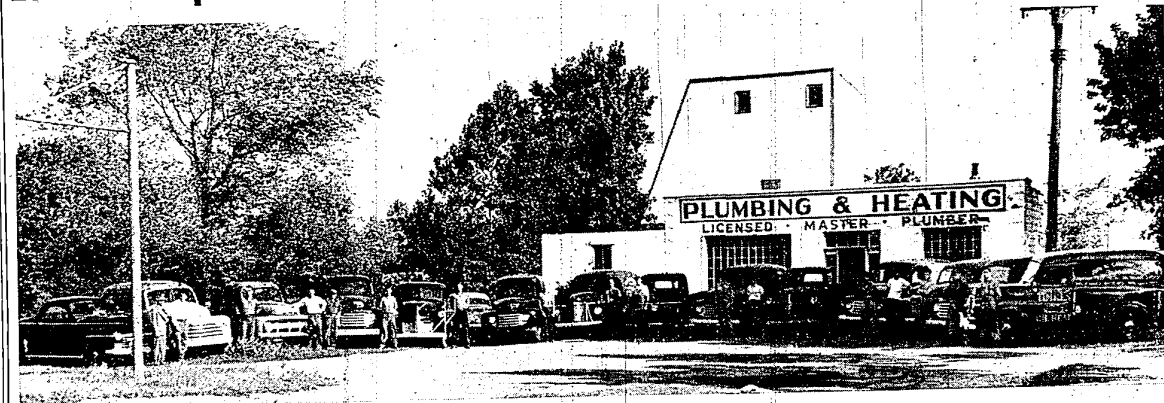
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
