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

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WENDELL BROWN HEADS HIGHLAND PARK CITY PROBE

Wendell Brown, 29221 Ardmore, Detroit attorney and member of the Farmington Township School District Board of Education, has been named special assistant attorney in Highland Park to investigate the city police department.

The investigation, which began this week, will cover the entire 1948-49 season. Highland Park police force. The probe is the result of recent arrests of patrolmen charged with the theft of more than \$6,000 worth of merchandise from establishments in the city.

TURKEY FESTIVAL TO BE HELD IN SAGINAW

This year's Michigan Turkey Festival will be held in the Auditorium in Saginaw December 5 and 6, according to William Aho, extension poultryman at Michigan State College and festival manager. Entries in this year's show are expected to top last year's record of nearly 400 live and dressed turkeys, Aho said. The 1951 turkey festival is a cooperative project of the Michigan State College, Michigan Department of Agriculture and the Saginaw Chamber of Commerce.

Two festive days are planned with activities of interest to turkey growers and consumers alike on the schedule. Highlights of the first day's program will include a panel discussion in the evening led by J. A. Davidson, of Michigan State College, temporarily on leave with the Kellogg Company. This panel, composed of leading turkey specialists, will discuss "Marketing Problems of Michigan Turkeys."

Judges of the turkey entries, E. Y. Smith of Cornell University, M. Darrow of Swift and Company, and Dr. L. E. Dawson of Michigan State College, will tell how to select a prize turkey at a contest or for the oven.

A program for both consumers and producers will take place from 2 to 4 p.m. December 5. Mary Bodwell, consumer education specialist with the MSC agricultural economics department, and Mary Holtman of the International Harvester Company, will demonstrate selecting, cooking, freezing and packaging turkeys.

Entries of live and dressed birds will be accepted from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. December 5.

on stated that the state has the full authority on the issuing of licenses for trailer camps and at the present time the Township has no jurisdiction over this matter.

Residents from the Pasadena Subdivision, Orchard Lake near 11 Mile Road, appeared before the Board to seek help in repairing the roads. Ernest Blanchard, Township Supervisor, stated that he would take the matter up with the County Road Commission and see if a survey of the roads could be made to determine the cost of repair. A request was also made to see if any action could be taken to prohibit parking on both sides of Alyce Kay Street. It was pointed out that the situation was responsible for an accident on the street last week. No definite action was taken by the Board.

The Board approved the purchase of a five horsepower, single phase fire siren for the northeast township fire station. The new siren is to be located at Tenth Electric on Northwestern Highway across from the fire station at Bell's Garage. Blanchard stated, in answer to a request for information on the progress of the Clarenceville fire station, that the Board is looking over fire stations in this vicinity. He added that two architects have approached the Board requesting interviews in regard to the preparation of plans for the construction of a new fire station.


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SHUT THE DOOR!!!
