Wendell Brown, 23921 Ardmore, Highland Park, attorney and member of the Farmington Township School District Board of Education, has been named special assistant city attorney in Highland Park to investigate the city police department.

The investigation, which began this week, will cover the entire 128-man Highland Park police force. The probe is the result of recent arrests of patrolmen charged with the theft of more than \$6,000 worth of merchandise from establishments in the city.

Brown served as legal advisor to the Ferguson graft grand jury in 1939 and 1940, was assistant state attorney general in 1941 and served as a special period as assistant Wayne County prosecutor in 1946. He is a past president of the Detroit Bar Association and the Farmington Kiwanis Club.

TURKEY FESTIVAL
TO BE HELD
IN SAGINAW

This year's Michigan Turkey Festival will be held in the Auditorium at Saginaw December 5 and 6, according to William Aho, extension poultryman at Michigan State College and festival manager.

Entries for this year's show are expected to top last year's record of nearly 400 live turkeys and 1,000 keys, he said. The 1951 turkey festival is a cooperative project of the Michigan Turkey Growers Association, Michigan State College, Michigan Department of Agriculture and the Saginaw Chamber of Commerce.

Two festive days are planned with activities of interest to turkey growers, consumers alike on the schedule. Highlights of the three day's program will include a panel discussion in the evening led by J. A. Davidson, of Michigan State College, temporarily on leave with the Kellogg Company. This panel, composed of leading turkey specialists, will discuss "Marketing Problems of Michigan Turkey Farmers." The judges of turkey entries, Dr. J. E. Dawson of Swift and Company, and Dr. L. E. Dawson of Michigan State College, will tell how to select a priate turkey at a contest or for the oven.

A program for both consumers and producers will take place from 2 to 4 p.m. December 5. Mrs. Mary Boddwell, extension education specialist with the MSC agricultural economics department, and Mary Holtzman of the International Harvester Company, will demonstrate selecting, cooking, freezing and packaging turkeys.

Entries of live and dressed birds will be accepted from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. December 5.

Four Boys Partially
Overcome By Fumes

Four boys, 14, 16, in a car driven by John E. Armstrong of 1675 Colburn, were partially overcome by monoxide fumes Saturday, Farmington City Police reported.

The boys were going to Kensington Park, police stated, when the car stopped in Farmington and the boys got out and began to stagger from the effects of the fumes.

All four, taken to a local physician, and none apparently suffered any serious after effects from the poisoning, police reported. They were riding in a closed car.

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
