150 Lakes, Rivers Open To Spear Fishing

Closes to 150 mostly southern Michigan lakes and rivers are open through December 31 to spearing, whitefish, ciscoes, suckers and carp.

Whitefish maximum catch is seven but there is no size limit on these fish according to the conservation department. On the other species there are neither size nor unit limits. Artificial light can be used.

Interested fishermen can check open waters in their area with the local conservation officer.

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
