## To Sell Cutting Rights In Three State Forests

Permits to cut 2,395,000 board feet of timber in three state forests will be public auctioned and offered under sealed bid November 23, 27, 28 and 30, the conservation department announces.

Selective logging rights are for the Sturgeon River, Escanaba River and Munuscong forests.

The November 23 auction will be at 10 a.m. at the Sturgeon River forest office, Iron Mountain, and the November 30 sale at 9 a.m. for Munuscong cutting is scheduled at the Chippewa County courthouse, Sault Ste. Marie.

Sealed bids for Escanaba River cutting will be opened at 11 a.m. on November 27 - 28 at the forest office in Gwin.

## 150 Lakes, Rivers Open To Spear Fishing

Close to 150 mostly southern Michigan lakes and rivers are open through December 31 to spear fishing whitefish, scioes, suckers and carp.

Whitefish maximum catch is seven but there is no size limit on these fish according to the conservation department. On the other species there are neither catch or size limits. Artificial light can be used.

Interested fishermen can check open waters in their area with the local conservation officer.

Coal-carrying Selt-unloading lake vessels can discharge their cargoes at the rate of 2,100 tons per hour.

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
