

U-M TV Program Has 1,400 Registrations

More than 1,400 registrations have been received for "Telecourses" offered by the University of Michigan over Detroit television station WWJ-TV every Sunday.

Total number of students in the courses is 977 (402 men and 574 women).

"Democracy in Action: Parliamentary Procedures," a seven week course, has the largest enrollment — 676. "Man and his World: Human Behavior" has 523 registered. "Understanding the Child," which begins December 16, has 233 students signed up.

During the six courses offered on television last year the University had more than 2,000 students registered. A fee of \$2 for fifteen weeks courses and \$1 for seven week courses is charged for supplies. Material mailed to students each week.

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
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
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
