

**AWARD BRONZE STAR
TO SFC HESLIP
FOR HEROIC ACTION**

Sergeant First Class James F. Heslip of 18290 Byron, was recently awarded the Bronze Star Medal with "V" device for heroic achievement while fighting with the Second Infantry Division in Korea, according to Army authorities.

Heslip, a member of the 9th Infantry, was distinguished himself in the vicinity of Yongsan, Korea, on September 2, 1951. On that date he volunteered to proceed ahead of friendly lines to recover a tank driver which had been damaged while trying to clear a road block. With knowledge of an enemy force of platoon size attacking the vehicle, he unhesitatingly advanced alone to the tank's position. He assisted in starting the vehicle and gave security as it was hacked into friendly lines. His actions kept a valuable piece of equipment from falling into enemy hands.

His wife, Elva Lee Heslip, lives in Farmington.


