SAYS USO TROUPER

American troops in Alaska are plagued by boredom and the damp, cold weather, according to Dorothy Wenzel, member of a USO Camp Shows unit which recently returned from a tour of Alaska.

In Alaska, she reports, there is nothing to do and no place to go. Few servicemen have their wives and children with them because living costs are too high. Most men cannot afford to go into town very often because of the price ranges.


"An ice cream soda costs 50 cents and a cup of coffee, so-called, costs 30 cents," Miss Wenzel reports. "You can see why the men in Alaska need USO Camp Shows." Funds to support USO shows are raised here in the United Campaign.

The men appreciated the shows so much that they provided special treats after each performance. One unit at a very isolated spot gave the trouper steak sandwiches to ply take on the plane with them. Another kept Miss Wenzel's coffee cup, with the marks of her lip.




