### Reforestation Projects Receive 6,892,000 Trees

Private and state reforestation projects received over 6,892,000 young trees this fall, the conservation department reports, or about a half million more than department nurseries supplied in the like 1950 planting period.

This fall some 3,335,000 red, white and jack pine seedlings and transplants were shipped to farmers, industries, schools and communities. Nearly 3,558,000 trees were planted in the Au Sable, Black Lake, Fife Lake, Hardwood, Higgins Lake, Ogemaw, Pere Marquette, Pigeon River, Presque Isle, Grand Sable, Iron Range, Lake Superior, Mackinac and Manistique River state forests.

No more requests are being accepted at present. The list of stock available for spring planting can be had from the department's forestry division office, Lansing, next month. Stock is sold at cost.

### PLAN SPECIAL SCHOOLS FOR POLICE OFFICERS IN STATE

Special classes in fingerprint identification and breaking and entering investigation will be conducted by the Michigan State Police for municipal, sheriff's and State Police officers at a series of schools to be held throughout the state during December and January, it is announced by Commissioner Donald S. Leonard.

"Of all major offenses," Leonard said, "police handle more breaking and entering crimes than any other single type. Fingerprint identification is an important phase of such investigations. It is our hope that this training program will help to reduce the problem."

Methods and techniques of investigating breaking and entering and proper handling of latent fingerprints evidence will be covered. There also will be demonstrations in the use of fingerprint cameras

and other equipment, conducting interviews, searching for suspects and stolen property, and utilizing police records, identification bureau and scientific crime and photographic laboratories.

The two-day schools are now scheduled in the eight cities where there are State Police district headquarters, but additional schools will be held in other locations if the enrollment warrants. Advance registrations of municipal and county officers indicate there will be a heavy attendance.

Schools in other subjects are to be held later.
