— Junior may have the edge on his father's clock, and Williams could have an orb cast at the governor's chair. Both have held off making any announcement. Both have a mind for good vote-getting names — but not good enough by itself to carry a winner.

This year more than 400,000 Christmas trees were sold in Michigan, jumping 1,115,660 in population between 1940 and 1950. Of that, 778,000 were due to births, 337,000 moving in from out of the state.

Joseph R. Tuzack put his Detroit restaurant on the map and money in his pocket when he lowered the prices to 1939 levels. But cutting down to five cents a bowl and T-bones to \$1.25 brought down every inspector in the city upon him. "They ordered the walls rat-proofed," Made him put in a heater. "They check everything from the pancake syrup to the neon sign," he said. Even the smoke inspector called on him. "Only smoke around here is out of the cash register," says Tuzack.

A bill has been filed for introduction in the 1952 legislature to triple the deductions allowed retailers on gross proceeds. Says Louis C. Nims, state revenue commissioner, "It might cost the state \$4,000,000 a year."

New Sewage Process Developed At MSC
A new method of eliminating lake and stream pollution at about one-third the cost of present methods has been developed by the Michigan State College Engineering Experiment Station.
The new method employs a process similar to that used in making carbonated beverages, according to Dr. C. C. DeWitt, station director.
Like shaking a carbonated drink with a stopper over the top, the sewage removal operation traps air in the waste water under pressure. When the pressure is released off the bottle — the bubbles float to the top, carrying waste materials with them, leaving the water clear.
Many cities which are faced with the problem and need to expand their sewage disposal systems, may find the new method more economical, Dr. DeWitt concluded.
