Building codes require expensive building material and prevent new techniques such as modular housing, she added, and most zoning ordinances place heavy stress on single-family homes with large lots.

Mrs. Russell admitted that even a modest influx of low-income housing would place a burden on a community and suggested that developers be required to develop a certain percentage of their subdivisions for low-income homes.

Scattering low-income homes through suburban neighborhoods would raise educational achievement of the deprived students but might take many years to achieve, she stated.

IN RESPONSE to questions, Mrs. Russell explained white, suburban students would not automatically achieve less by being bussed to a Detroit school.

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
