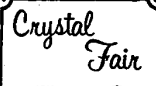
THE JR. Woodcreekers met last month in the home of Lee Ortmann to elect a new slate of officers and to plan events for the coming year.

Kenbrook Gymnasts Capture State Title

The Kenbrook Elementary School boys gymnastic team of Farmington Public Schools, coached by Mrs. Evelyn Davidson, is state champion after earning a total of 106 points to win the Michigan Assn. for Gymnastics (MAG) state competition.

All nine boys who participated in the MAG regional meet held in Clarenceville High School placed in the top 10 and qualified for the state finals.

AT THE state meet, the boys gathered enough points to become the best team in their division.

State results for Kenbrook gymnasts were: Blair Bowman, tied for first on bars; second on side horse; and seventh in floor exercises; Bob Burns, ninth on parallel bars; Richard Burrell, fifth on horizontal bar and still rings; seventh on side bars, eighth on parallel bars; ninth in vaulting, and 10th on trampoline.

Also: Rex Grimes, first on side horse, tied for first on parallel bars and fifth in vaulting; Mark Musco, eighth in tumbling; Peter Musco, eighth on side horse; and Steve Robertson, seventh in tumbling and eighth on trampoline.

Meredith Wins \$200

FARMINGTON John T. Meredith of Farmington was one of two winners of the 1972 Henry Campbell Moot Court competition conducted recently at the University of Michigan Law School.

Meredith, working on a team with Ned Fisher of Waukegan, Ill., argued a hypothetical court case March 9 before a distinguished bench that included U.S. Supreme Court Justice Harry A. Blackmun.

Meredith received \$200 for placing first. His team represented employees of a hypothetical metals company who claimed their civil rights were violated when they were fired for not working on a religious holiday.
