Music Week Concerts Begin May 7

With the theme "Music Creates New Horizons," the 4th annual observance of National Music Week opens at 3 p.m., Sunday, May 7, with a festival concert in Farmington.

The event takes place in Harrison High School, 2995 12 Mile Road, Farmington, under auspices of the Farmington Musicale, an affiliate of the National Federation of Music Clubs.

THE MUSICALE sponsors the week-long celebration locally, and plans this year include a week of musical activity at Southfield's Tel-Twelve Mall.

Tickets for the Sunday concert will be available at the door at \$2.50 per family, \$1 for adults and 50 cents for students.

Performing will be first place winners in the musicale's 1972 scholarship competition in piano, brass, winds, strings and voice. Also appearing will be a clarinet choir, conducted by Frank Barber; Farmington High's Twelve Tones under the baton of Bill Feucht; the Harrison High Stage Band; the Farmington Community Concert Band, with Paul Barber, directing; and the Farmington Musicale Chorus, directed by Sue McCallum.

Sunday afternoon, at 2, the Ben Joe of Michigan, Inc., will kick off the list of events at the mall.

Thursday, May 11, 7:30 p.m.—Farmington Junior High Concert Band, an award-winning group of instrumentalists.

Friday, May 12, 7:30 p.m.—The Mercyares from Our Lady of Mercy High School, Farmington, a well-known singing group which has appeared on both television and radio.

Observerland women have been having a lot of fun lately collecting such items as two little pigs, skydiving lessons, a deerstalker cap, 25 T-bone steaks, and a lobster-a-month. They have not been engaged in a protracted treasure hunt... they have been "go-getters" for Channel 56 TV, which launches its annual fund-raising auction Sunday, May 7, at 2 p.m.

THE LIST ALSO includes four weeks at camp, use of a camper for a weekend, lease of a car, a \$5 lunch per week for a year, sinks, a hand-woven stadium blanket, an evening with Gundella the Witch, a year's supply of passes to a movie theater, swimming pools, a 34-piece concert band, a barrel of pickles, a backyard fountain, tennis and golf lessons.

All will go to the highest bidders, along with other goods collected throughout the Detroit metropolitan area. The auction will run throughout the week from 2 p.m. to midnight, as long as the goods hold out.

The idea is to earn money for Channel 56, the area's only public non-profit television station, which is prevented by law from carrying commercials. Last year's auction proceeds supplied nearly one-

third of the station's operating budget and made possible several new local programs in addition to the popular

"Sesame Street" and "Civilisation."
