Continued from Page 1A. nion plan contributions." Treasurer Thomas Nolan and Trustee David Stader both added it was a good contract. Stader expressed reservations that cost of living should be given as a flat allowance for the cost of being computed against the officers' base pay.

Lichtman added the three-year pact was even more important because the township is in a state of flux as it approaches a decision on becoming a city.

The charter commission will now be able to study expenditures and revenues more rationally with the three-year pact because police salaries comprise the major portion of the township's budget.

Motion to ratify the contract was made by Lichtman, supported by Nolan, and passed 6-0 with Trustee Mrs. Margaret Schaefer, who is still hospitalized, absent.
