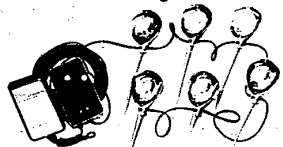


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Great Lakes Cleanup Is Named Chief Project

Protection of the Great Lakes and their restoration to health was designated as chief importance at the 22nd annual conference of the American Association of University Women held in Detroit recently.

Seven action proposals were put forward by 700 delegates from Michigan, Wisconsin, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois. Mrs. Douglas Keys, president of the Michigan division said, "This involves controlling assaults from the air, study of the shoreline and land planning, which affects water, cleaning of streams feeding into the lakes, controlling the silt of power plants or whatever installations lead to degrading the waters. We will, of course, introduce and support

whatever legislation is needed to protect the lakes."

TO UNDERLINE AAUW's support of the principal of equity in educational opportunity, the members resolved that the Michigan division oppose any "legislative act or constitutional amendment by the State Legislatures or the U.S. Congress which would prohibit any school district from using any tool at its disposal that would bring about integrated quality education."

The meeting also reaffirmed the association's stand taken at the 1971 Dallas convention which supports the withdrawal of the U.S. from the southeast Asian war. The delegates voted examination of all phases of juvenile health, including delinquency prevention, education, rights and rehabilitation, next in order of urgency.

Other proposals covered the role of creativity in American life as taught, or not taught, in schools, study of international economic policy, evaluation of government spending priorities and women in the universities.

A HIGHLIGHT of the convention was a display of projects undertaken by the 61 branches of the Michigan AAUW to celebrate its golden anniversary.

Mrs. Paul W. Brown of Petoskey was chosen president - elect for one year and will become president for a two-year term. Mrs. Blewett A. Smyth of Battle Creek was elected second vice-president in charge of membership. Mrs. John D. Altstetter of Dearborn was elected treasurer.

Mrs. Harry Dreffe, president of the Wayne Branch, and Mrs. Harold Goss and Olive Shale were among the local women who attended the conference.
