OCC Offers Science Institute

This summer the Orchard Ridge campus of Oakland Community College will offer its second annual summer science institute for Oakland County high school juniors and seniors.

Registrations are currently being accepted at the Farmington campus for the institute which is limited to the first 30 applicants. A \$10 lab fee and purchase of a textbook is required for the six-week course running three days a week from June 26 to Aug. 4.

The institute will provide interested science students with an opportunity to explore their physical world and, through guided experimentation, acquire tools for further investigation.

Certificates of completion will be awarded upon completion. Classes will meet on Mondays and Wednesdays from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m. and Friday from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m. in the college's science complex, at Orchard Lake and I-26.

Students who have completed one course in algebra and have an interest in science can call Dr. Charles Wym at the college for applications.

Amendment Draws Support

State Rep. Marvin Stempion (D-Livonia) recently appeared at a public hearing with Michigan Congresswoman Martha Griffiths (D-Detroit) to get support for Stempion's resolution to ratify the proposed equal rights amendment to the U.S. Constitution.

Mrs. Griffiths was a leader in the fight for Congressional approval of the amendment. Before it can be added to the Constitution it must be ratified by 38 states.

Conducted by the House Committee on State Affairs, the hearing produced overwhelming support for the amendment.

French Makes Space Parts




