

Local GOP Likes Wallace Best

FARMINGTON
George Wallace led the popular vote in the Farmington area, presidential preference balloting Tuesday, as he did statewide, gathering a total of 6,983 votes from city and township residents. He led both President Nixon and Sen. McGovern by 2-1 margins with Nixon getting 3,993 and McGovern 3,418 from both city and township. Although he swept the popularity vote, Wallace was only one precinct delegate out

of a possible 23 to attend the 19th District Democratic convention. Only two precinct delegates on the ballot were committed to Wallace and one was elected.

McGovern won six precinct delegates to attend the 19th convention and Rep. Shirley Chisholm one. The remaining Democratic winning delegates were uncommitted.

WALLACE gained 5,645 votes in the township with McGovern running second with 2,746 votes on the Democratic ballot.

Township residents gave Hubert Humphrey 1,654 votes; Mrs. Chisholm, 161; Edmund Muskie, 188; Vance Hanks, nine; Henry Jackson, 35; and 74 voted uncommitted.

On the Republican side of the ballot, township residents gave Nixon 3,167 votes; Paul McCloskey, 74, and 35 voted uncommitted.

City residents gave 1,338 votes to Wallace, 672 to McGovern, 39 to Muskie, 42 to Mrs. Chisholm, and 206 to Humphrey.

City Republicans gave Nixon 826 votes, McCloskey 13 and eight voted uncommitted. Twenty-four city residents voted for the American Independent Party which did not have a presidential candidate on the ballot but which carried Wallace's picture by the party label.

In both city and township there was evidence that 50 per cent of the Republican voters crossed party lines and voted on the Democratic side of the ballot Tuesday, obviously to vote for Wallace.

In November 1970, 6,707 township residents voted for Democrat Richard Austin for Secretary of State and 7,333 township residents voted for Republican Emil Lockwood. Standard procedure is to use the vote for secretary of state in the last election (1970) to measure the number of voters from each party.

Comparing 1970 to Tuesday's election, the tallies show 9,912 voting on Democratic 'presidential' candidates and only 3,276 for Republican presidential candidates. This appears to be a cross-over of about 3,200 Republicans voting for Wallace.

In the city, 2,111 voted for Republican Lockwood in 1970 and 1,570 for Democrat Austin for Secretary of State. Tuesday, 2,323 city residents

voted Democratic and only 847 Republican on the presidential preference ballot. This appears to be a Republican cross-over of 153 for Wallace.

In 1970, 14,040 township residents voted compared to 14,211 in Tuesday's primary. In 1970, 3,969 city residents voted in the general election compared to 3,480 for Tuesday's primary.

DEMOCRATIC precinct delegates elected in the city Tuesday were:

Precinct One, John Campbell, 88 votes, committed to McGovern (M); Precinct Two, William Hartsock, 106 votes, (M); Precinct Three, Raymond Lundsten, 173 (U); Precinct Four, Fred Kingston, 98, committed to Wallace.

City Republican delegates elected were: Precinct One, Mark Timmons with 84 votes edging out Augie Barbrick with 81 votes; Precinct Two, Robert Waldron, 47; Precinct Four, Harvey Masow, 76; and Precinct Five, Marty L. Barth, 41 votes.

TOWNSHIP Republican delegates elected were:

Precinct One, Lois Makee, 18 votes running unopposed; Precinct Three, Thomas McMillan with 89 votes committed to Nixon (N) edging out Marian Lan who had 77 votes and was uncommitted; Precinct Four, Wilbur Davis (N), 46 votes; Precinct Six, Pat Hamlin (N) with 52 votes upstaging Jane Wallen with 41; Precinct Seven, Isabel Haynes (N) 99 votes to defeat Kenneth Hilbert with 82; Precinct Eight, Daniel McKinnon (N), 117; Precinct Nine, Elsa Harms (N) with 168 votes defeating Edward Kilinski (N) with 111 votes; and Precinct 10, Marion Livingston (N) getting 74 votes running unopposed.

Other Republican delegate winners were: 11, Helen Davidson (N) with 91 votes to skin by James Davenport (N) with 90 votes; 12, Shirley Stadler (N), 114 votes to beat Mrs. Mary Kenney (U) who received 23 votes; 13, Lorraine Hawley (N), 21 votes running unopposed; 14, Jack Berry (U) winning with 56 votes over

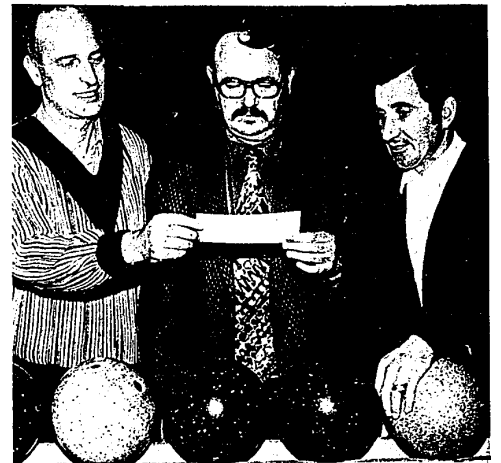
Henry Grysh's 40 and Art Pusey's 30 votes; 16, Milton Lichterman (N), 86 votes running unopposed; 17, Gerald Ellsworth (N) with 101 votes to defeat William Beattie (N) with 85 votes; and 18, Karen Eisenbert (N), with 82 votes running unopposed.

TOWNSHIP Democratic delegates elected were:

Precinct One, Joyce Hungerford (U), 79 votes running unopposed; Two, Robert Dennis committed to McGovern with 51 votes, running unopposed; Three, Paul Livingston (U) with 124 votes to defeat Richard Edgar

(U) with 112 votes; Five, Marilyn Yvon (U) with 54 votes running unopposed. Also: Six, Leona Zaboriski (U) with 126 votes running unopposed; Seven, Robert Kipper (M) 127 votes to defeat Clarence Gann (U) with 112 votes; Eight, Eugene Su committed to McGovern winning easily with 143 votes to his opponent's three; Nine, Annette Sipher committed to McGovern got 215 votes, Shirley Sroka committed to Wallace got 199 votes, and Fred Harris, uncommitted, 197 votes; and Precinct 10, Elizabeth O'Connor (M), 117 votes.

Other township delegates elected were: 11, Patrick Mulrooney (U), 92 votes running unopposed; 12, Aldo Vagnozzi (U) 178 votes running unopposed; 13, Richard Stewart (U) 83 votes running unopposed; 14, Clarence Dawson (U) with 122 votes to beat Anne Matter (U) with 95 votes; 15, Steve Silverman (M) with 256 votes to beat Mitchell Nelson (U) with 122 votes; 17, Rodney Landsman committed to Mrs. Chisholm got 115 votes running unopposed; and 18, Brian Olmstead (U) got 81 votes.
