AINBUMNE INUCK --Gary G. Stevens, 23, of Detroit, escaped death when the truck he was driving went airborne Tuesday, May 23, at about 12:25 pm. near I-96 and Nine Mile, Far-mington Townshin Paline mington Township. Police report Stevens was driving a dump truck loaded with hot asphalt for Four Way Not asphalt for Four way Asphalt Paving of Pontiac when the brakes gave out. He tried to slow down, but his transmission disinte-grated and spread itself over 1,000 feet. The truck word down the exit ramn went down the exit ramp. through a stop sign and across Nine Mile, where it across Nine Mile, where it hit a shoulder and became airborne for about 12 feet across a ditch. The truck landed upright and prolanded upright and pro-ceeded southwesterly through a field, plowing up dirt for 70 feet before stopping in a swampy field, causing the load to shift over to the right of the dump box bending the frame. This crushed the cab and pinned Stevens by the neck between the steering wheel and back of the cab for about 15 minutes until the steering wheel was cut away. Stevens was taken to Botsford General Hospital and treated for back injuries.
