Persons interested in helping are asked to call the church office.

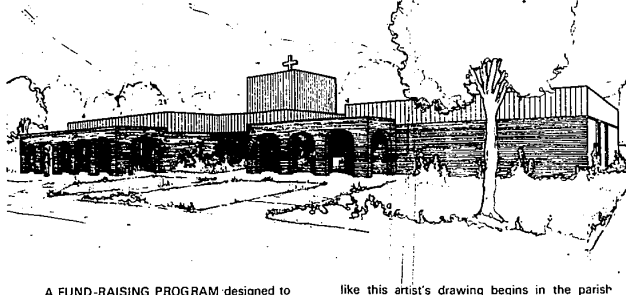

St. Aidan Church Launches Parish Development Program

St. Aidan Catholic parish in Livonia will begin Sunday, June 4, a development fund program designed to renovate and expand its present building.

The parish hopes to make architectural changes and construct four multi-purpose classrooms for the church, located at Farmington Road at Six Mile. Estimated cost is \$250,000.

A team of 80 workers will visit each member of the parish, asking a donation over the normal weekly offering to cover the cost of the expansion program.

The present St. Aidan structure, built nine years ago, was intended originally as one that would house a new parish temporarily and then be used for schoolrooms. But with the Detroit ar-

chdiocese trend away from parochial schools in each parish, that idea had to be changed.

The Rev. J. Edward Seifen, St. Aidan pastor, said the present plan was worked out after serious consideration of various alternatives open to the parish.

He said he had worked with the Parish Council to develop it, and added that all concerned felt "this is the best course of action to take in order to keep St. Aidan's the vibrant powerhouse of faith it has been in this area for the past nine years."

The renovation will make the building more "churchlike," said a brochure to be distributed in connection with the development fund program, and the multi-purpose nature of the new classrooms will enable St.

Aidan to keep its program adaptable to varied functions.

The program, titled "Let's Go Forward Together," is headed by Raymond DeFiore and Herb Rosen.

DeFiore urged prompt action on the part of St. Aidan members, adding that is the time for the parish to move on a project that will aid all its people.

He is also secretary of Sinai Hospital and vice-president of United Hebrew Schools.

He holds memberships in the Detroit Bar Association and the State Bar of Michigan. In previous years he has served as a member of the Regional Planning Council of Metropolitan Detroit (now the Southeast Michigan Council of Government), as a commissioner and president of the Detroit House of Correction, as president of the Detroit Urban League, and as chairman of both the Allied Jewish Campaign and the Detroit Committee for State of Israel Bonds.

Religion Update

Rev. Lester Kinsolving's

The 37 presidents of the United States have come into the office with a variety of prior occupations: 22 attorneys, five soldiers, two engineers, a newspaper publisher, an engineer, an author-politician, a planter, a tailor and a haberdasher - but not a single minister.

But if the South Dakota preacher which has been burning up the Democratic primaries continues hot through November, the White House may have its first resident pastor, the nearly Rev. George McGovern.

Sen. McGovern was never ordained, although as a student at Garrett Theological Seminary he served as pastor of "Diamond Lake" (now Mundelein) Methodist Church, just north of Chicago.

HE MIGHT just as well clean up one of the few who never defeated him in South Dakota's leading sport of debating) moved into a cockroach-infested apartment near Northwestern University.

And when his GI Bill of Rights check was delayed for two weeks on soup, peanut butter and milk for the baby. (Later, when he was director of the Ford For Peace program, he had an audience with Pope John XXIII - who told him: "Wine your Maker asks if you have fed the hungry, you can answer 'Yes.'")

His ministerial experience, as well as the influence of his father, a devout clergyman

commented the senator. "The hierarchy I served under weren't at all like that. I just remember hearing one district superintendent from another area mention a \$10,000 (salary) church which I thought was a bit mercenary. As for my own congregation, the size doubled.

"Sure, I liked to preach, but I believe I demonstrated that ministering to the bereaved was every bit as important. I left only because I didn't feel I was cut out for the ceremonial functions and administrative minutiae of the parochial ministry."

HAD HE BEEN LESS than sincere, the eloquent and attractive young man might easily have continued drawing his salary and residing in the church's parsonage. Instead, he and his stunning wife

who built six churches, seems destined never to leave him - and is reflected in a life style which motivated the late Robert Kennedy to describe him as "the most decent man in the Senate."

AS EXAMPLES of this, are the following from his speeches:

"The 'practical men' have had lining after lining. But just as long as men continue to soot! at ideals and spiritually, just so long will we continue to reap the tragic harvest of so-called practical men."

"To remain silent in the face of policies we believe to be wrong is not patriotism, it is moral cowardice - a form of treason to one's conscience and to the nation...The people of a state can easily secure a Senator, but a Senator cannot easily secure a new conscience...I want to be elected. But I do not want the election so badly that I will ever sacrifice my conscience to achieve it."

McGovern's BIOGRAPHER, former Time magazine staffer Robert Sam Anson, makes brief mention of this one year pastorate, in a book with which McGovern cooperated, but readily agreed to make no attempt to edit. As a result, Anson claims the South Dakota senator left the ministry and switched to teaching, because:

"He had long since become disillusioned of the value of organized religion."

But during an exclusive interview, the senator told me: "I think Anson has misrepresented his own view. I have talked about the limitations of the church - and of all other human institutions for that matter - but the church has played an enormous and generally uplifting role in human society."

McGovern went on to disagree with his biographer's speculations that he left the ministry because of costly attendance at services, a greater desire to write sermons than minister to the bereaved, and disillusionment with a hierarchy which was overly concerned with money.

"That was a cheap shot,"
