THE BRENNANS' involvement with AFS began when Mary, a Bentley High School junior just transferred from a Detroit high school, saw a notice that applications were being accepted for the following summer.

"I didn't know anything about the organization then,"

Mary remembers, "but I filled out the form and was accepted."

She spent a great summer with the Espinosa family in the Philippines and came home with some strong new family ties and a yen for more travel. Both came forward last summer when she traveled around Europe and managed a visit in London with her Filipino "mother," Dr. Purification Espinosa, who was attending a pediatrics convention there.

THE NEXT YEAR the AFS chapter at Bentley had an opening for a student to spend a full school year with a family in Australia. Next sister Maureen didn't think she had a chance, since Mary had been chosen, but she too was selected to represent this country abroad.

So when Mrs. Brennan learned last summer that there was a slight problem finding homes for incoming AFS visitors, she checked with her family to see if everyone would like an addition for the year.

"I particularly wanted to be sure that Laura, our present high school student, would like to have a visitor," she said. "She's the one who would be most affected."

Laura, while having no ambitions of her own to go traveling because "I don't like other people's food," was delighted at the prospect of an exchange student. So was the rest of the family.

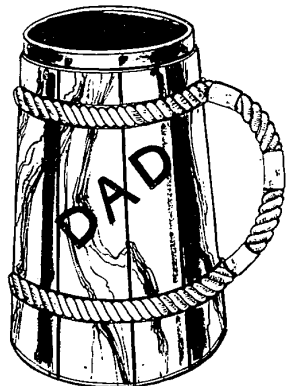

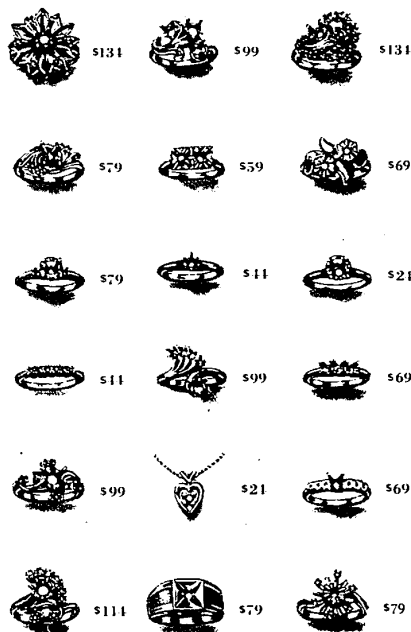
