Consumers Bill OK 'd

A bill designed to protect consumers cleared the State Legislature recently with final support from Observerland

support from Observerland senators.
The bill passed the Senate 33-0 allowing consumers to stop payment on faulty merchandise.
Voltag for the final version were Sens. David Plawacki (D-Dearborn Helghis), Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth), and Daniel Cooper (D-Oak Park). Sen. William Faust (D-Westland) was absent but had voted in support of the earlier version of the bill.
Currently, consumers must

Currently, consumers must continute to make payments on merchandise, even though the store from which they purchased it refuses to or can't correct defects in the product or exchange the faulty goods. Some stores sell installment contracts to finance companies or a third party which become the "holder in due course" of the contract.

The bill allows consumers to use the fact that the merchandise they purchased is faulty as a defense for stopping payments on an installment contract to the

faulty as a defense for stopping payments on an in-stallment contract to the holder induc course, Plawecki said. "I strongly supported this legislation because present law has left the consumer in an impossible situation in which there is no way he can receive equitable and fair consideration on justifiable complaints," Plawecki said.

Senators OK **Pollution Fine**

Observerland senators recently supported a bill to increase the fine a court may levy for a water pollution violation from the current fine of \$500 per day to \$10,000 per day

of soot per day to \$10,000 per day.

Sens. David Plawecki (D-Dearborn Heights), Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) and Daniel Cooper (D-Oak Park) voted for the bill which passed 27-5. Sen. William Faust (D-Westland) was excused from the session.

"The \$10,000 fine, in my opinion, will finally make it unprofitable to contribute to the pollution of Michigan waterways."
