McDonald Bill Seeks Change On Contracts

A reversal of federal policy in selecting engineers and architects for federal projects is proposed in a bill introduced by U.S. Rep. Jack McDonald (R-Waterford).

In the past, architects and engineers for projects being financed with public funds have been selected on the basis of the lowest bids.

McDonald's bill would amend the Federal Property and Administrative Services Act of 1949 to establish federal policy of selecting firms "on the basis of their competence and capacity to perform work, not on the basis of how little they will charge."

"As we enter into new projects, especially in the field of improving our environment, we find that too often the low bidder simply can not do the job for which he bid," McDonald said.

OCC Incumbents Reelected To Board's 6-Year Terms

The two incumbents on the Oakland Community College Board of Trustees won reelection Monday.

Mrs. Lila Johnson, 12728 LaSalle, Huntington Woods, and George Mosher, 551

Mohegan, were elected to six-year terms.

Both have served on the board for eight years since it was created and both worked on the citizens committee that formed the college. The

college has a campus in Farmington called Orchard Ridge.

MOSHER WAS the top vote-getter with 21,845 votes followed by Mrs. Johnson with 17,382. Rev. J. Harold Ellens, who based his campaign on criticism of the college's finances, trailed Mrs. Johnson by more than 2,000 votes totaling 15,713.

Former OCC student William Lefel was fourth with 12,377 votes. The four remaining candidates drew less than 10,000 votes with Rosemary Hill at 5,911; Cell- Chapla 5,111; Hope Frey, 7,892; and Dante DiVitto, 5,749.

Results from Southfield indicated there might be a contest between Mrs. Johnson and Lefel. Lefel was second there with 1,716. Mosher had 2,940 and Mrs. Johnson was third with 1,574.

THE ELECTION campaign was marked with severe criticism of the college's finances and programs. Both Mosher and Mrs. Johnson defended the programs and promised to stabilize them if reelected.

The programs under attack included a method of testing which determines how the

student learns. Once the results are analyzed, the students are taught by a method catering to them individually.

Since it is new, the program has just been implemented on a small portion of the classes offered. The traditional method of teaching is still most common on the campus.

An attorney with General Motors, Mosher was chairman of the OCC board for six years. He said he sought reelection because the college had reached a stage in development where it needed time to stabilize.

Mosher holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Oregon and graduated from Columbia Law School in 1946. He is a member of the New York, Michigan and American Bar Assns. He formerly was an instructor at New York University and had a private law practice in New York.

Mrs. Johnson is an administrative assistant for the National Hearing Aid Society. She served both as vice chairman and secretary of the board.

2 Local Men Earn MBAs

Two local men recently received master's degrees in business administration from Michigan State University.

David E. Brown, 28655 Kendallwood Dr., Farmington, and Martin L. Mutz Jr., 29639 Curtis, Livonia, were among the seventh graduating class of the Advanced Management Program.

Mutz is director of systems of American Motors Corp., and Brown is senior systems analyst of the Information Systems Dept., Chevrolet Motor Division, General Motors Corp.

The two-year program provides intensive training for middle management and senior business executives in the Detroit area.

Yeager Is GOP Voter Chairman

Weldon O. Yeager of Bloomfield Village was named deputy county chairman for voter services for the Republican Committee of Oakland County.

An active Republican leader for 23 years, Yeager was the only Republican elected state representative from Wayne County in 1969-70. He was the Observerland delegate to the Michigan Constitutional Convention in 1961-62 and was later appointed by former Gov. George Romney to direct the state's Workman's Compensation Dept.

Yeager will be responsible for the total planning and coordination of Republican programs in registration, absentee ballots, election day activity, special groups and other assignments.

Tours of the General Motors Technical Center in Warren will be conducted Tuesdays to Sundays this summer through Labor Day.

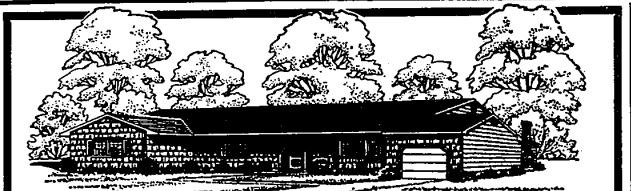
