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'New You' Can Emerge From Makeover Service

If you're willing to give up two or three hours of your time and about \$35, you could get a new look that could astonish your husband and make you the envy of your neighbors.

Out of the whole thing will vary with what's needed. Carol had her hair frosted,

because according to Jason, her dark hair made her complexion look sallow. She also exchanged her dark-framed glasses for a pair of contact lenses.

Carol's shaggy eyebrows got a trim and were lightened. She got false eyelashes, trimmed by Jason to fit, and lessons in how to put them on. (Wait a minute so the glue will get a little tacky. Also, peel the old glue off in the morning when it's dry.)

JASON, who paints portraits as well as faces, achieves a look of face-lifting by re-shaping the face visually. His facial analysis and make-up prescriptions are designed to accentuate everyone's better features.

"One of the biggest mistakes women make," he says, "is refusing to change their brows." To him, changing the brow shape is as important as changing the hair's shape.

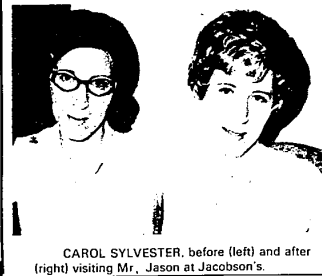
"I shape the brows in respect to the eye, which doesn't mean a thin brow, but a brow shaped to enhance your eyes. I usually lighten the brows a shade or two. The lighter, less conspicuous brow gives the illusion of a larger eye, and that's where the attention is focused today; there and the lips, which are taking brighter, deeper colors

with the fresh, dewy look of make-up."

Jason takes a realistic approach, not only at the woman herself, but at her life-style, and whether or not she is talented and can set her hair herself. If not, he promises a style that's easy to keep between appointments.

With his use of under-base on the face, lines disappear, shadows vanish and a smooth new skin surface is ready for dramatic accents. It takes Carol about 15 minutes to put on her make-up as prescribed for her by Jason.

Although his attention is concentrated on hair and make-up, Jason might also give some tips that would help in other areas. A member of Weight Watchers, he has given himself a "miracle makeover" by losing 175 pounds.
