

Coy Seeking County Seat

FARMINGTON
Lew L. Coy, 52-year-old
Wisconsin Republican, will seek
third term on the Oakland
County Board of
Commissioners, which includes
part of the Farmington area.
The 24th district includes all
of the City of Farmington, the
southern half of Farmington
Township, all of Novi, Wixom
and Walled Lake, and parts of
Northville, Northville

Township, and Novi Township,
and all of the City of
South Lyon and Lyon Township.
COY IS A retired captain
from the Detroit Fire
Department, having served
that organization for 25 years.
He is a graduate of Oakland
Community College and the
Wayne State University
Mortuary School. He served in

the U.S. Navy during World
War II as a hospital corpsman.
In 1969, Coy was appointed
to the Oakland County Board
of Health for a five-year term
and is presently chairman of
that board.
He also serves on the personnel,
legislative, and health
committees of the board of
commissioners and is the
county's representative to the

Huron River Watershed
Council.

DURING his present term,
Coy successfully introduced
legislation which permits toll-free
telephone service to the
County Court House from any
place in the county.
He also successfully introduced
a new police which
requires the drain commission
to list the drain on which work
has been done, the date on
which it was accomplished,
and itemization of the cost on
a job-by-job basis rather than
billing one total amount to the
local community.

Nowak served as president

in 1970 and, in 1971, as vice
president of the United States
Jaycees.

He serves on the YMCA
board of directors, the Farmington
Community Center
board and is president of the
Farmington - West Bloomfield
Youth Football Association
Dad's Club.

IN THE past several years,
he has been active in govern-
ment, having served on the
Farmington Board of Review
and as chairman of the
Beautification Committee.

He is currently Oakland
County chairman for the re-
election of U. S. Senator
Robert Griffin. A sought-
after public speaker, Nowak
in the past year has traveled
to more than 15 states and
throughout Michigan speaking
to audiences from 50 to 4,000
on a variety of professional
and civic subjects.

Busing Reaction

Court of Appeals ruling that the Richmond, Va.,
busing plan was unconstitutional.

RELATIVELY few phone calls were made to
the school district offices Thursday morning.

Those callers who did contact the district
were referred to the district's "hotline" in-
formation telephone number (477-7492) to hear a
recorded message from Dr. Smith.
After furnishing what news he knew of the
order, Smith assured callers on the recorder that
the ruling was being thoroughly researched and legal
action would be taken when it was deemed
necessary.

Roth stated Wednesday that the per pupil
transportation cost under his plan would be
between \$50-\$60. He added that the maximum bus
ride one-way would be about 40 minutes and in-
dicated there was no evidence to indicate this ride
would be harmful to kindergarten or elementary
children.

Roth also commented that transporting
students by bus is safer than using car pools or
walking to school. He suggested that those who
oppose cross-district busing are motivated by
racial reasons because busing students is a
common practice in the suburbs.

Roth estimates there are 225,000 students
presently being bused in the 53 school districts
involved in the plan he approved. Under his plan,
an additional 85,000 students would be bused -
requiring the purchase of some 300 buses.

Roth also has asked that each school building
involved have a ratio of 10 per cent black teachers
and a proportionate share of black ad-
ministrators.

Although Roth failed to indicate, there is
reason to believe he waited until Wednesday to
hand down the ruling to avoid issuance of the
order having any effects on the school board
elections conducted statewide two days before,
June 12.

Members of the City Council were all of the opinion that this might be worth looking into and agreed to study the matter.

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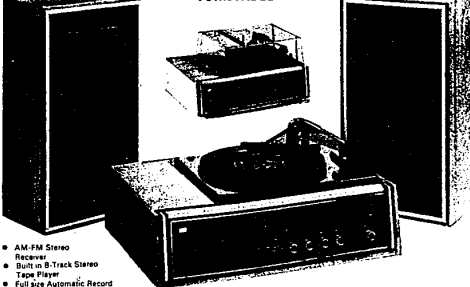


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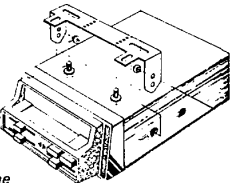
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
