An award for outstanding service went to the John Glenn Stagecrafters.

## OCC Offers 3 Theater Classes

The Orchard Ridge campus theater department of Oakland Community College will offer three theater courses during its summer session, June 28 to Aug. 18.

Students may elect two of these courses during registration June 26 and 27 from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m., on the campus, 27055 Orchard Lake Road, Farmington.

The program is centered around a summer theater workshop (Theater 256), a four-credit course meeting Tuesday and Thursday from 9 a.m. to noon.

Students may elect Theater 156, "Introduction to the Art of Theater," a three-credit course which meets Mondays and Wednesdays from 7 to 10 p.m. "Art of the Theater" deals with the history and appreciation of theater arts. Another choice is Theater 157, "Fundamentals of Acting," a three-credit course which meets Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 7 to 10.

In the workshop, students will receive training and practical experience in all aspects of theatrical production. The program will culminate in the presentation of a play. This will be taught by Wallace F. Smith.

The last production for the fall season will be a twin-bill of Menotti's "The Medium" and "The Telephone."

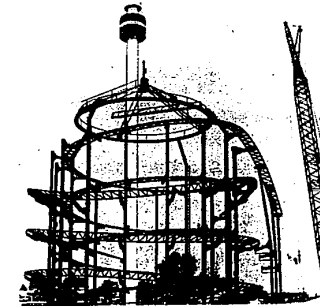
