Joan Sullivan was maid of honor for her sister and the best man was James Pastron, of Lorain, Ohio, cousin of the bridegroom.

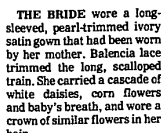

Then more calls, to the bus company to change routes, to camp sites to check reservations, and of course to all the parents to be sure they were agreeable to the changes and to Southern Oakland Girl Scouts to file a revised trip plan.

"The council office here said they hoped we'd be able to talk to other troops after we get back," Mrs. Pilo said, "to show that having things go wrong doesn't mean you have to scrap everything."

THEN, AS FINISHING touches were being put on the new itinerary, the mail brought a letter from one of the Black Hills leaders who had been helping Mrs. Pilo arrange the trip.

"I had written just before the flood, asking for exact directions to the camp," she said. "She was telling us we were still welcome, but the main road was washed out and we'd have to take a round-about route, and the Council office in Rapid City wasn't open because it had taken several days before they could even get in with hip boots and

things there were about ruined."

Mrs. Pilo said she managed then to talk to the leaders in the stricken area and tell of the change of plans. "But she said she hoped we wouldn't forget them and try to visit next summer, and I said we'd see if we could."

The girls and their leaders have some other ideas they'll talk over more while traveling and camping and presenting their Petoskey stones to girls in Montana instead of South Dakota.

"The Girl Scout council out there, and many of the girls and their families, have lost everything and we want to help," Mrs. Pilo said.

"We're going to organize a paper drive, starting in Farmington and spreading to the rest of the Southern Oakland council, to help the council office reopen.

"We'd also like to see if we can get families in Farmington to skip the used uniform sale this year and contribute outgrown Scout uniforms to the girls in the Black Hills who lost theirs."
