Sealed bids for the purchase of the above bonds will be received by the undersigned at the City Hall, 23500 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan 48024 until 9:00 o'clock p.m., Eastern Standard Time, on Wednesday the 5th of July, 1972, at which time and place said bids will be publicly opened and read.
Said bonds will be coupon bonds consisting of sixteen (16) bonds of the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, numbered consecutively in order of maturity from 1 upwards, will be dated July 1, 1972, and will mature serially, without option of prior redemption, as follows:
\$1,000.00 July 1, 1973.
\$2,000.00 July 1st of each year from 1974 to 1978, inclusive.
\$1,000.00 July 1, 1979.
\$2,000.00 July 1st of each of the years 1980 and 1981.
Said bonds will bear interest from their date at a rate or rates not exceeding seven and one-half per cent (7 1/2%) per annum, expressed in multiples of 1/8 or 1/20 of 1%, or any combination thereof, on Wednesday the 5th of July 1st of each year. The interest at any one time will be payable only on all bonds maturing in any one year must carry the same interest rate, and each coupon period shall be determined by one cent (1%) only. No bond may bear interest at a rate which is less than 50% of the rate borne by any other bond of this issue. Both principal and interest will be payable at a bank or trust company located in the State of Michigan or of the United States of America, to be designated by the original purchaser of the bonds. The designation of the paying agent shall be subject to the approval of the City. Approval is intended to the date of delivery of such bonds must be paid by the purchaser at the time of delivery.
For the purpose of awarding bonds, the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining, at the rate or rates specified therein, the total dollar value of all interest on the bonds from August 1, 1972 to their maturity and deducting therefrom any premium. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose bid on the above composition produces the lowest interest cost to the City. No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the bonds herein offered, or at a price less than their par value will be considered.
Said bonds are issued in anticipation of the collection of a like amount of nine (9) deferred installments of Special Assessments on Special Assessment Roll No. 71-51. For the purpose of paying part of the cost of parking lot improvements in said Special Assessment District in the City of Farmington and in the event special assessment collections pledged for debt service on the special assessment bonds prove insufficient for that purpose, the City may advance interest on its general funds sufficient amounts to meet said debt service. The full faith and credit of the City is pledged as additional security for the special assessment bonds. Taxes may be levied without limitation as to the rate or amount to implement said full faith and credit pledge.
A certified or cashier's check in the amount of \$320.00 drawn upon an recognized bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Treasurer of the City of Farmington, must accompany each bid as a guaranty of good faith on the part of the bidder, to be forfeited as liquidated damages if such bid is accepted and the bidder fails to take and pay for the bonds. No interest will be allowed on the good faith checks and checks of unscrupulous bidders will be promptly returned to each bidder's representative or by registered mail.
Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified opinion of Miller, Campbell, Padlock and Stone, Attorneys of Detroit, Michigan, approving the validity of the bonds, which opinion will be furnished without expense to the purchaser of the bonds prior to the delivery thereof. There will also be furnished the usual closing certificates, dated as of the date of delivery of the bonds, in respect to the bonds, including a statement that there is no litigation pending or, to the knowledge of the signers thereof, threatened, affecting the validity of the bonds. The City shall furnish bonds ready for execution at the time specified. Bonds will be delivered at such time as may be agreed upon with the purchaser. Said bonds will be delivered not later than the forty-fifth (45) day after the date of sale, or if such day falls on a Saturday, Sunday or legal holiday, the next business day thereafter, and if said bonds are not delivered by twelve o'clock noon, Eastern Standard Time, on such day, the successful bidder may withdraw his proposal by serving notice of cancellation in writing on the undersigned, in which event the good faith check shall be promptly returned.

City Police Receive 5.1 Per Cent Pay Hike

FARMINGTON A one-year contract has been negotiated between the City of Farmington and its public safety officers. The contract approved by city council Monday night provides for a 5.1 per cent increase over the total wage-fringe package presently "enjoyed" by public safety officers, explained City Manager Robert Deadman.

The contract provides a \$600 increase effective July 1 for public safety officers for a maximum salary after three years of \$12,800. Public safety sergeants will receive a \$650 increase July 1 for a maximum salary of \$13,850.

On Jan. 1, 1973, public safety officers will receive a \$350 raise for a \$13,150 maximum salary with sergeants getting a \$350 hike for a \$14,200 maximum salary. The city increased holiday

benefits by adding one holiday, George Washington's birthday on Feb. 22. The city agreed to discontinue paying officers a uniform cleaning allowance and has entered a contract with a local cleaner for cleaning of uniforms. Officers sent out of the community who use their private vehicles for transportation on city business will be reimbursed at 12 cents per mile under the new contract.

TO INDUCE officers to complete their college education, the city has agreed to pay an improvement factor in relationship to the amount of college credits the officer has completed in police-related courses.

Educational compensation will be paid on this schedule: \$100 for 30 credit hours based on a 15-week course; \$200 for 60 hours; \$250 for an associate
