## Road Rally Is Saturday

**FARMINGTON**  
A road rally will be held Saturday, June 24, by the Farmington chapter of the Order of DeMolay. Registration is at 10:30 a.m. and starting time a half-hour later. Both starting point and registration will be at the Farmington Rd. entrance to North Farmington High School.

The price is \$3 per car and driver, and \$1 for the navigator and each extra passenger. Proceeds will go toward furthering the work of the DeMolay young men in the community.

The rally will be conducted on a time, distance, and speed scoring system with prizes for all contestants.

There will be a 50-car registration limit on a first-come, first-serve basis.

## Barbrick Runs For OC Seat

August Barbrick, 35, of Schulte Dr., Farmington, has announced his candidacy as a Republican for Oakland County commissioner in District 27. It includes the entire City of Farmington, six precincts in Farmington Township, and one precinct in Southfield.

Barbrick, a self-employed manufacturer's representative, has been owner of Augie Barbrick Enterprises since 1970.

He was previously national marketing manager for Rolled Alloys, Inc., Detroit, and belongs to the Detroit and Saginaw chapters of the American Society of Metals.

Barbrick is a member of the Farmington Exchange Club, Farmington Jaycees and Farmington YMCA. He also belongs to the Alta Lakes Homeowners Assn. and Michigan Jaycees in which he served as district vice president of eight local chapters.

He has served the local Jaycees as director and vice president. In the past few years, he has worked on YMCA fund-raising, Jaycees chairman to purchase playground equipment for Drake City Park, initiated current Jaycees community-wide Parks and Recreation Development Committee, and served as Jaycees chairman for its role in the 1971 River Rouge clean-up.

Barbrick was active in the Farmington Community Center renovation, was a keyworker for Citizens for a Better Farmington, and campaigned for consolidation in November 1969.

A Republican, he is serving as precinct delegate to the county and attended the June 17 state Republican convention.

Barbrick states Oakland County has long been recognized as one of the best county governments in the state.

"I will work to the utmost of my ability to carry on the established policy of sound management practices within the present framework, but will strive toward a more efficient home rule charter. Our future lies in how well we serve and involve our youth. It is incumbent upon our generation to leave a better system of government than we have inherited.

"Working together, we will overcome the nay-sayers, foot-draggers, and entrenched patronage seekers, and build a new and better system for the persons of Oakland County.

"I am optimistic and believe county government of the 1970s can solve many of the gravest problems confronting America today without usurping local government autonomy."

Barbrick graduated from Michigan State University in industrial management and has lived in Farmington five years.

Two Farmington Township men were arrested Wednesday and charged with extortion after allegedly calling a township mother and demanding \$155 be paid or her son would be assaulted.

Patrick J. Terminelli, 20, of 21511 Oxford, and David J. Plagens, 19, of 27393 Skye Dr., were arraigned before Farmington District Judge Michael J. Hand. Both stood mute and a court date will be set. Bond was set at \$10,000 for Terminelli and \$5,000 for Plagens.

Ronald Holko, director of public safety, states Mrs. Jean Watkins of 24618 Adams Ct., Farmington Township, had received a phone call Tuesday demanding money.

Mrs. Watkins was informed her son, Patrick Watkins, 17, was being held and would be assaulted if a payment of \$155 were not made, says Holko. Payment was made at the Driftwood Lounge on Grand River in Redford Township, and the hostage was recovered. After the payoff was made, both accused men fled the scene, police report.
