

Leadership Is Needed For Schools--Perrin

FARMINGTON "I would like to see the board take this year in such a manner that would restore the community's confidence in its actions and programs."

Speaking was the new president of the Farmington Board of Education, Kenneth Perrin, who was elected during Wednesday's organizational meeting. He spoke briefly with the Enterprise and Observer following the meeting about his concerns for the board. Emphasizing the board and not his presidency, Perrin said the board's activities "will require some give and take on the part of each board member so that we can reach these positions on which we can all agree."

ECHOING STATEMENTS expressed by Aldo Vagnozzi, board vice president, Perrin called for a greater emphasis on education.

"There's been too great an emphasis on what some people see as politics on the board of education, and I think we should get back to the business of emphasizing education," he added.

Vagnozzi had called upon

the board during the meeting to "talk more about education," and added that he believed that the "community is ready to follow strong direction" from the board.

Perrin is beginning his fourth year on the board, having served as vice president for the last two years. Since assuming his board position, Perrin has also served on the building and site, finance, public relations and policy committees of the board.
