Dog Obedience
Show Planned

FARMINGTON

A special dog obedience demonstration has been scheduled on Thursday, July 27, at 5 p.m. at the Farmington Plaza shopping center.

The show was invited by local veterinarian, Dr. John Richardson, who also runs the pet show, set for Friday afternoon at the same location.

The demonstration will be conducted by the Sportsmen's Dog Training Club of Detroit, the first such club in Michigan, originating in 1942.

The club conducts one of the most active training centers in the state all year long in a VFW hall in Ferndale.

A beginning course is taught, covering three months of instruction.

But many owners want to learn more, and therefore the club sponsors classes which train dogs and handlers for showing in the American Kennel Club licensed trials

which lead to obedience degrees awarded by the AKC in licensed competition.

The degrees include companion dog (CD), companion dog excellent (CDX) and Utility Dog (UD). Several years ago the club decided to put on demonstrations, and such a demonstration will be held Thursday. Mrs. Mira Jilbert, spokesman for the club, explains:

"To make things more interesting, the routines have been choreographed to cover pure obedience exercises, but done with a flair, with twists and variations that make them thrilling to watch."

The dogs even take part in scent relays, were teams of handlers and dogs compete. Here the dogs must jump hurdles and retrieve articles from their own handlers.

The demonstration is under the direction of the club's trainer, Jacquie Rowe.

Antique Cars Displayed

An antique car display will be held in the First Federal parking lot in downtown Farmington Saturday from noon until 5 during the Festival.

Display chairman Bill Flora said several cars will be there with their owners. Included for the show are an American LaFrance early speedster, Ford Model 'A' and Model 'T', a 1930 Durant and a 1930 Packard.

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Pet Show Is Friday At Plaza

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Bingo Gets Approval From Reps

LANSING
When gambling fever swept the Legislature recently, all of Observerland's voting state representatives helped pass a bill to legalize bingo games.

When the bill passed 87-8, local legislators voting for it included Reps. Raymond Smit (R-Ann Arbor), Richard Young (D-DeARBorn Heights), Marvin Stempian (D-Livonia), John Bennett (D-Redford Township), Thomas Brown (D-Westland), Raymond Baker (R-Farmington) and James DeFebaugh.

Rep. Joseph Forbes (D-Oak Park) was absent and Rep. James Tierney (D-Garden City) didn't vote.

The measure would permit religious, fraternal, service, and veterans organizations as well as senior citizens to obtain bingo licenses on payment of \$50.

Licensing would be handled by the lottery bureau which was created under the recently approved state lottery bill.

License regulations would stipulate that prices of bingo cards be \$1 or less and that the total value of any prizes or merchandise awarded in any single day be no more than \$250. No single prize can exceed \$500.

The regulations also stipulate that the organization get a special permit to conduct more than 25 bingo games in one day.

This year the pet show will be held at 3 p.m., Friday, July 29. According to John Richardson, DVM, show chairman, it is very important that entry forms be turned in by 6 p.m. the day before—Thursday, July 27.

The entry forms should be turned in to the Pets 'N' Particulars store at 22830 Mooney, one block west of Orchard Lake Rd., just north of Grand River. Here are the rules:

Each contestant may enter only one category in the show; however, another member of the family may enter the same pet in a different category, using a separate entry blank.

Contestants must keep pets on a leash, or in a proper

container at all times. And, entrants should be ready to enter the show ring when their category is called.

Richardson said the age limit for contestants is 14; parents should not allow children to bring pets into the show ring that they cannot control since contestants must handle their own pets and no parents will be allowed in the ring.

Trophies will be awarded to the first, second and third place winners in each category. And, the first place winner in each category will compete for a trophy to be awarded to the best pet in the show. Trophies are on display at Pets 'N' Particulars.

Best of show honors last year went to Mary Margaret Schwartz and her Collie, Rex.

All contestants receive a certificate of participation whether they win or not. The categories are:

- Pet with most spots.
- Pet with saddest face.
- Shaggiest pet.
- Most unusual pet.
- Twin class—two most evenly matched pets.
- Largest pet.
- Most original costume, pet and owner. (Two divisions, one for the boys, and one for girls.)
- Waggiest tail.
- Best trained pet (60 seconds to perform).

Entry forms are available from any of the Farmington Plaza merchants. The Farmington Enterprise and Observer is not publishing the complete entry form at the request of the pet show committee, since all information would have to be transferred to an official form the day of the show.
