

20 Dealers Will Highlight Antique Show

FARMINGTON
The second annual antique show to raise funds for the Farmington Community Center will be held at the center Friday and Saturday of the Festival.

The show will run from 1 to 9 p.m., and show chairman Mrs. Sally Conroy has put together a roster of 20 dealers.

Co-chairman Hope Nahstoll, from the center's board of directors, has been lining up the many volunteers needed to put on the show.

Admission has been set at \$1, but the money will go to benefit the center, as will the profits from food served during the two-day show.

Mrs. Conroy said the show would display many fine antiques, including 18th century furniture, accessories, tools, lighting, primitives, china, and old toys.

Mrs. Nahstoll said the

donation for admission to the show was much needed because the center had not met its current financial goal. "We have not yet met the goals of our current drive, even though the center is serving many hundreds of people in the Farmington community in its classes, meeting rooms and wedding receptions," Mrs. Nahstoll said.

The center is located in a gracious, historic, century-old home surrounded by four acres of landscaped grounds at 24705 Farmington Rd., between 10 and 11 Mile Roads.

Fireworks chairman Robert Beauchamp said the display

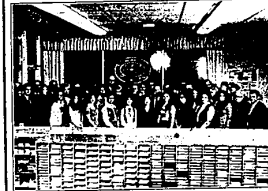
will be handled by professionals this year from Nationwide Fireworks, Inc. of Saginaw, Mich.

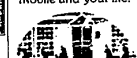

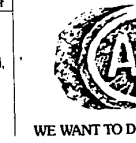

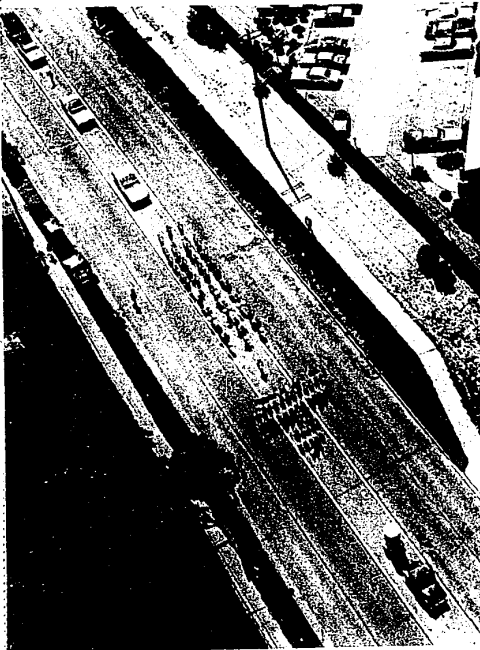
