Bob is president of the Future Farmington Association and is a trustee of the Council of Homeowners Associations of Farmington Township. Formerly he served as president of the Canterbury Commons Association and as chairman of the Education Resources Committee of First Presbyterian Church.

Bob is a trained administrator, with B.S. and Masters degrees in Business Administration from Wayne State University. He is a manufacturers representative and design engineer to the automotive industry. Bob is a member of the Michigan Society of Planning Officials, the Engineering Society of Detroit, the Society of Manufacturers Agents and of the Textile Institute.

He is prepared to work full time as Supervisor of Farmington Township, because he is convinced that it is a full time job.

Commission Considers Districts

FARMINGTON
The Farmington Hills Charter Commission is considering alternatives to an at-large election for city council. At a recent meeting, Commissioner Richard Frankel proposed a nine-member council with five members elected at large, and four members elected by districts established to maintain the one-man one-vote requirement. The commission was unable to agree on the merits of the proposal, and the item was delayed temporarily from the section on composition of the city.

The commission has been considering three proposals: election at large; combinations of districts like Frankel's proposal; and nominations by districts and elections at large. The commission also adopted the wording "The city council shall have the power to appoint the safety director, upon recommendation of the city manager."

The wording was intended to make the appointment the answerable directly to the council.

The next meeting is expected to cover several items under the general topic "City Legislation; Initiative and Referendum."

County Jail Opens Door

PONTIAC
The new 470 - inmate Oakland County Law Enforcement - Jail complex in Pontiac will be dedicated Thursday, Aug. 3.

Welcoming remarks will be made by Daniel T. Murphy, chairman of the county Board of Auditors, Lawrence R. Pernick of Southfield, chairman of the county Board of Commissioners, will comment on the needs and goals of the jail.

Keynote speaker will be Gus Harrison, director of the Michigan Department of Corrections, who will speak on the development of correctional institutions in the state.

LOCATED ON 12-acres at the County Service Center on Telegraph, the 167,000 - square foot structure replaces the overcrowded jail in downtown Pontiac which was built more than 45 years ago.

In the new complex are a maximum security county jail, medium security areas to permit work release of prisoners, and all county sheriff's road patrol operations including investigative and licensing functions.

The facility also has a morgue, parking garage, and emergency operating center.

TED DZIURMAN, chief engineer, Oakland County Facilities and Operations Department, says: "In all our examinations of county jails, we found there hadn't been any significant improvements during the past 45 years. We were phasing out an old facility and we didn't want more of the same."

Giffels Associates, Inc., architects - engineers - planners of Detroit, were assigned the task of coming up with a new and imaginative complex at minimum possible cost.

The result was an entirely new design. Gone is the old, expensive concept of multi-story cell blocks, facing an outside wall for natural lighting and ventilation through barred windows.

Replacing the old concept is a scheme of single - story cell blocks receiving natural light from unbarred overhead skylights which are inaccessible and impervious.

Alarm systems add additional security, and ventilation is provided by forced-air heating and ventilating systems providing uniform air movement.

OTHER improvements include reduction of noise by use of precast concrete cell partitions rather than steel plate.

A communication system permits monitoring of noise levels within the cell blocks so that disturbances are immediately pinpointed.

The communication network also includes closed-circuit TV at critical control points, an integral part of the total security system.

Nowak Is Running For County Post

Republican Patrick M. Nowak is running for Oakland County commissioner from the 25th district.

Nowak, the only Farmington candidate for the nomination in the district which runs up into West Bloomfield and Commerce Township, was former president of the Michigan Jaycees.

He was given the Distinguished Service Award in 1972 from the Jaycees, is a former member of the board of review, former chairman of the Farmington Beautification Committee, and former vice president of the U.S. Jaycees.
