

# Congressional Candidates Face Area Primary

Two Republicans are competing for their party's nomination to the 17th Congressional District seat now held by U.S. Rep. Martha Griffiths (D-Detroit) in the primary election Tuesday, Aug. 8.

Mrs. Griffiths is unopposed in the Democratic primary. The newly redrawn district includes Farmington City and Township, Southfield, Redford Township and northwest Detroit.

Each of the candidates for the \$42,000 office was surveyed by the League of Women Voters of Oakland County and asked:

1. What do you consider the national priorities for the next Congress? Why?

2. By what means do you propose the federal government should give short and/or long-term assistance to urban areas?

The LWV does not support or oppose candidates and doesn't take responsibility for views stated by the candidates.

The candidates' responses follow:

**MARTHA W. GRIFFITHS:** Democrat; Detroit resident; Age 60; Education: BA University of Missouri, law degree University of Michigan; Occupation: member of Congress since 1954; Experience: four years in Michigan House of Representatives, 10 months judge and recorder of Detroit Recorder's Court, four years contractor for the Army during World War II.

1. "National health care, tax reform and welfare reform. All of these matters will come before the Ways and Means Committee, of which I am a member in the House. I have introduced in the House legislation to establish a national health insurance program to provide adequate health care for all Americans. Both the public, and the budget will demand attention to these matters."

2. "With revenue sharing, the federal government will be able to increase to the extent of \$30 billion for the next five years. But, what I think we need to do is to redefine the responsibilities of the federal government to make the federal government assume a much larger part of the nation's welfare costs and education costs."

**RALPH E. JUDD:** Republican; Detroit resident; Age 34; Education: Highland Park Junior College, 1968, B.S. in business administration Wayne State University, 1972; Occupation: systems analyst for manufacturing firm, certified data processor.

Experience: Republican nominee for State Senate 1970, 1968.

1. "Anti-busing legislation: to stop parents from worrying over the safety and education of their children. This would be put together with more money for low-income schooling. Employment: Not enough is being done about jobs by the present Congress. Drugs: More help in this area for obvious reasons. Prison reform: To truly reform inmates to return to society. Housing programs; The housing programs need control of the funds so that the FHA scandal won't happen again."

2. "Short-term assistance might come from revenue sharing along with emergency grants to special projects. Long-term assistance would be the federal government to take care of those areas where there is a duplication of local, state and federal efforts such as welfare assistance, consumer protection, environmental control and training of the unemployed."

**THOMAS E. KLUNZINGER:** Republican; Detroit resident; Age 27; Education: B.A. with honors Michigan State University 1966; Occupation: writer.

Experience: U.S. assay commissioner in 1972 as presidential appointee, Republican nominee for Congress 1970.

1. "Congress must achieve meaningful review of the structure in order to maintain public confidence in the fairness of government. Also, the federal welfare system must be revamped to meet today's needs, to eliminate waste, and to make any benefits worth while. At the same time, Congress must continue efforts to better our environment and to provide quality education for all without unnecessary interruption of living patterns."

2. "Existing federal programs provide funds for urban areas, but often on a too-limited basis. Therefore, I believe that revenue sharing (as proposed by President Nixon) would be the best approach, since it provides readily available monies for cities to use in areas in which they need it the most."

## Peace Group Looks At Candidate Records

Thomas E. Klunzinger, candidate for the Republican nomination for the 17th Congressional District seat, said he would vote now for reducing military spending and reallocation of savings to domestic programs while his opponent said he is undecided.

Klunzinger and Ralph E. Judd, both from Detroit, are opposing each other in the Aug. 8 primary for the seat now held by U.S. Rep. Martha Griffiths (D-Detroit).

They were surveyed by the Peace and National Priorities Center in Oakland County on issues such as war and military spending. Mrs. Griffiths, who is unopposed in the primary, didn't respond to the questionnaire.

**BOTH CANDIDATES** said they would vote for President Nixon's Soviet-American agreements limiting defensive nuclear weapons, for Defense Secretary Melvin Laird's request for funding a new submarine program and against Laird's request for funding the B1 bomber.

Judd said he would vote against decreasing troop levels in Europe while Klunzinger said he would vote for the decrease.

On diplomatic relations, both candidates said they would vote for setting up relations with China but not with Cuba.

Judd said he would vote for the residual forces in Vietnam, Laos, Cambodia and Thailand while his opponent said he would oppose appropriations for forces in Laos and Cambodia but support them in Vietnam and Thailand.

**BOTH WOULD** support appropriations for the air war in Indochina and give military hardware and "security supporting" assistance to the governments of South Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos.

Also, both candidates agreed that the United States security is dependent upon or is enhanced by large scale military assistance to countries such as Greece, Brazil, and Indonesia.

Regarding the draft, neither candidate would commit himself to voting for measures to curb the President's military induction authority or to repeal the selective service's act, but Klunzinger said he "would prefer an all-volunteer Army."

The questionnaire was distributed by Dr. Richard E. Angell, president of the center, and Mrs. Gerry McNabb, executive secretary and several volunteers.

The center doesn't take positions on issues or endorse candidates. It functions as an information agency.

**ORDINANCE NO. C-319-72**  
AMENDMENT NO. 3 TO THE ZONING MAP OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON, OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN

**Section 1** That the territory lying within the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, be re-zoned as follows:  
Part of the Northeast 1/4 of Section 29, 11N Range 9 East, Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan, being described as:  
Beginning at the corner of the East line of Section 29, said point being North 1 degree 45 minutes 09 seconds East 93 77 feet from the East 1/4 corner of Section 29, 11N Range 9 East, thence North 88 degrees 11 minutes 08 seconds West 871 20 feet, thence South 1 degree 45 minutes 09 seconds West 93 77 feet, thence along the East and West 1/4 line of Section 29, North 88 degrees 11 minutes 08 seconds West 198 79 feet, thence North 1 degree 45 minutes 09 seconds East 314 61 feet, thence South 87 degrees 59 minutes 26 seconds East 1070 0 feet, thence along the East line of Section 29, South 1 degree 45 minutes 09 seconds West 817 20 feet to the point of beginning, containing 22.42 acres, from R 1 D (Farview) Unit Development to R 6 Residential District.

**Section 2** Family District  
The attached map showing the property affected by this amendment is made part of the amendment.

**Section 3** This ordinance shall be known as Amendment No. 3 to the Zoning Map of the City of Farmington.  
This ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council on June 19, 1972, was adopted and enacted at the next regular meeting of the Council on July 5, 1972 and will become effective ten days after publication on August 6, 1972.
