

Youth Symphony Is Seeking New Members



IF YOU'RE a student musician, you could be in this picture. The Plymouth Youth Symphony is hoping to increase its membership to 100, and

membership is open to all who are interested. Other youth symphonies are also auditioning for members at this time of the year.

The Plymouth Youth Symphony, a full-scale symphonic orchestra for students in grades seven to 12, is seeking members from Plymouth and the surrounding suburbs.

The orchestra, now in its fourth season, hopes to attain a membership of 100 students this year, and has several openings in all string sections and in wind and percussion sections.

The orchestra rehearses from 7 to 9 p.m., every Tuesday throughout the school year in Room 1603 (rehearsal hall) of the Plymouth-Salem High School, Joy and Canton Center Roads.

FIRST REHEARSALS will be held Sept. 19 and 26 and will be "open rehearsals," to which all interested students are invited. Applications for membership will be available. There will be no auditions at this time and no prepared solo is required at any time this year, but a minimum of two years playing experience is recommended.

Membership for the season is \$10. Refreshments will be served at break time. The orchestra is directed by H. Michael Endres, who is also director of the Plymouth High School Orchestra.

According to Endres the new Tuesday evening rehearsals may appeal to residents in surrounding communities such as Livonia, Westland, Garden City,

Northville, Farmington and Ann Arbor, since many youth symphonies rehearse on Saturdays.

Benefits of student membership, besides orchestral experience, include trips to Detroit and Ann Arbor to hear major orchestras and soloists from around the world.

Advanced instrumentalists will perform solo works with the orchestra.

OLDER STUDENTS and section leaders will work with their own sections in rehearsals and will also work with younger students on an individual basis.

There is also an active program of social activities for the members including a potluck dinner, trips, hayrides and parties.

Endres received his bachelor and master of music degrees from the University of Michigan. He has also done graduate work at the University of Kansas and California State College. He has been a member of the Hillsdale, Plymouth, Jackson and Ann Arbor Symphony Orchestras and has been principal bass of the Eastern Michigan University - Civic Orchestra and the Scandinavian Symphony for three years.

Mr. and Mrs. Jeffrey Drifmeyer, who also teach music in the Plymouth schools, will assist him.

Preliminary auditions for all sections of the Detroit Symphony Youth Orchestra are still open to any talented young musician living in the Detroit metropolitan area.

Applicants will be asked to perform a solo composition of their own choosing and to sight-read some representative orchestral excerpts.

The orchestra is entering its third season. Turner, who is principal trombonist of the Detroit Symphony, has just been appointed administrator of the youth group.

Students who are interested in playing in the Michigan Youth Symphony may obtain applications for auditions from the University of Michigan School of Music, Ann Arbor, 48105.

Although application for audition is usually by invitation, interested students may apply.

The orchestra will rehearse every North in the rehearsal hall of the music school on north campus. Rehearsal hours are from 1 to 3:30 p.m.
