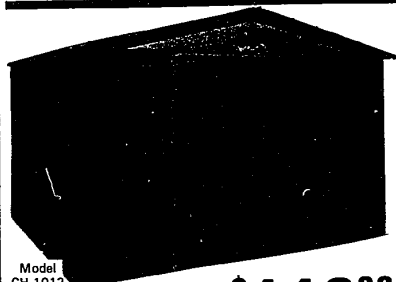

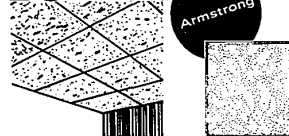

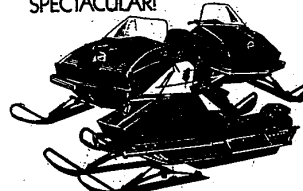

3 Reps Win Praise On Ecology

Three Observerland state representatives have "outstanding" records on environmental legislation according to the Detroit Area Coalition for the Environment, which rated all the metropolitan legislators on their voting record.

State Reps. Marvin Stempien (D-Livonia) John Bennett (D-Redford Township) and Raymond Baker (R-Farmington) received outstanding ratings on 11 bills and five amendments by voting "right" on 15 occasions.

Rep. James Defebaugh (R-Birmingham) received a "very good" rating while three other local legislators were listed as having very poor voting records. These include Reps. Joseph Forbes (D-Oak Park), Richard Young (D-Deerborn Heights) and Thomas Brown (D-Westland).

BENNETT, Stempien and Baker were listed as voting for an air pollution control bill raising penalties for pollution and providing for surveillance fees, wilderness protection act, inland lakes and streams protection bill, snowmobile regulations, removal of a bounty on coyotes, sedimentation control, bill board regulations, increased water pollution penalties and a bill to protect endangered species.

Stempien voted against an environmental education bill while the others voted for it. Bennett didn't vote on the mass transit bill, but Stempien and Baker voted for it.

Forbes showed the "poorest" voting record, according to the environmental group, because he voted against the air pollution control bill, environmental education bill, lakes and streams bill and water pollution bill.

He didn't vote on the sedimentation bill, but voted for eight of the 16 bills and amendments.

Brown had voted against the sedimentation control bill and inland lakes and streams bill and didn't vote on the mass transit bill. He voted for eight of the bills and amendments.

Defebaugh voted for 14 of the measures but didn't vote on the water pollution control bill.

Duck, Decoy Contest Set Sept. 16

ROCKWOOD The Pointe Mouillee State Game Area on Lake Erie at the mouth of the Huron River will be the site of the 25th annual Duck Hunters Tournament and Midweek Duck Decoy Contest.

It's set for Sunday, Sept. 17, beginning at 9:30 a.m. There is no admission charge or entry fee, according to Hy Dahika, chairman and founder.

Entrants must register at the headquarters by 10 a.m. for sneak shooting over decoys, layout and boat shooting. Duck retrieving trials are open to dogs of any breed not qualified in AKC trials.

Other events include a hip boots marsh race, duck plucking contest and Nate Quillen memorial punt boat race.

Trap shooting events begin at 10 and run all day. A trading post (no dealers allowed) will be set up on the grounds.

Activities in the Midwest Waterfowl Decoy Assn. contest begin Saturday, Sept. 16, in the Sheraton Motor Inn at 175 and West Rd. in Trenton with a day-long display.

Entrants must register by 9 a.m. Sunday for the decoy making contest. Entries may be made in the novice and open classes for duck and goose species.
