

Gun Safety Program Under Way

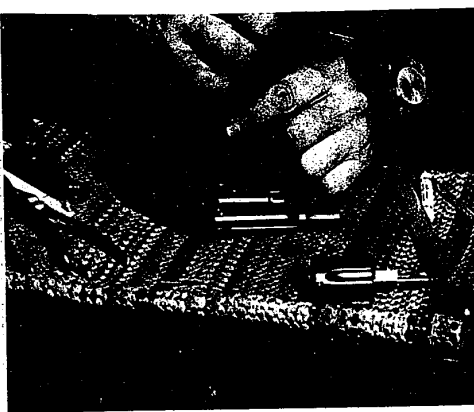
FARMINGTON Public Safety Director Ronald Holko invited Farmington Township handgun owners to come and test out their weapons on the police pistol range last weekend, but turnout was light. Professional instructors were available to check over handguns to make sure they could be safely fired.

"There wasn't as much participation as I had anticipated," Holko said Monday. Most of the people who came wanted to try out the sites on their deer rifles, but we had to tell them we didn't have that kind of a range."

The program, begun by Holko because he feels there are many handgun owners in the township who have never fired their weapons, will continue from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. every Saturday at the Township Police Dept., 11 Mile, and Orchard Lake Rds.

Junk Car Plan Urged

FARMINGTON A program to encourage owners to dispose of old junked cars has been proposed by Farmington Township Supervisor Earl Teeples.

The program, similar to one which failed to pass the State Legislature last year, would pay the final owner of a junk car \$15 for consigning it to its last resting place.

The money would come from a fund built up from fees charged each time the car changed hands—with new car buyers paying \$5, down to the last (fifth) owner who would be charged \$1.

An act of the State Legislature would be required for the proposal to become law, Teeples says. A similar bill, which charged a flat \$15 to new car owners, was rejected last year.
