

## Ruhl, Egloff, Burton: Three Players To Watch As All-State Candidates

As schoolboy footballers throughout Observerland officially open the 1972 campaign, the attention of fans, young and old, college coaches and scouts will be focussed on the performances of at least three prep stars...each considered a possibility for all-state honors.

The trio includes: Bruce Ruhl, of Southfield Lathrup who was a first team choice of the Associated Press in 1971; Ron Egloff of Plymouth; and Dennis Burton of Garden City East.

HEADING THE group is Ruhl, who may well be the most outstanding back in Michigan if he continues to show the same improvement as he has each year as a Lathrup regular.

Bruce has scored 31 touchdowns in three years as a starter, gained 1,800 yards rushing and 1,000 more on 54 pass interceptions during that period.

He will be cast in the role of a triple threat back this year as a senior and Coach Darrell Harper believes he'll be just as effective in passing and punting as he was as just a ball carrier.

In addition to his offensive feats, Ruhl is one of the best defensive backs in the area. All of which could add up to all-state honors if he performs as expected.

EGLOFF IS A younger brother of the famed family that has made major contributions to Plymouth gridiron history. Randy, oldest of the brothers was all-state at PHS and then went on to Yale where he twice won all-Eastern acclaim.

Dick followed Randy and was a member of an unbeaten Blue machine. He received all-state mention and went on to star for Arizona State at Tempe.

Ron, a 6-3, 190 pounder, was all-Suburban Eight, all-Suburban and all-Observerland as an offensive end and defensive linebacker.

He likes 'nothing better than hard contact, excels as a pass receiver and could be the best punter in the league.

BURTON, a 5-10, 160 pound halfback, was one of the top scorers in Observerland a year ago when he won all-Mid-Wayne League laurels and sparked East to a 7-2 record.

He collected 14 touchdowns and gained 1,200 yards rushing as a junior. That on top of the 25 touchdowns he scored in his sophomore year as a member of the junior varsity. That's a total of 39 six-pointers in two years. Small wonder that folks out Garden City way are thinking in terms of all-state.

All three started play this weekend and the season continues for eight more games...plenty of time for each to show he deserves the state's top honor.
