What's doing at Michigan?


No less than six of the squad now in training hail from Observerland. The list includes: Craig Mutch from Thurston, Bob Thornbladh and Jon Cederberg of Plymouth, Art Fediuk and Mike Day of Livonia and Dave Brandon, who has a Plymouth address but comes from South Lyon.

Of the sextet, Thornbladh is one of two outstanding fullback candidates, and Mutch, a scholastic all-American in his senior year, appears in line for a starting berth at linebacker.

Both were expected to see plenty of action in the opener against Northwestern Saturday (Sept. 16).

OUT KALAMAZOO way at Western Michigan, Bubba Daniels, of Livonia Stevenson, is listed as a starting defensive tackle; Bob Pokorny, from Redford Union, will start at tackle after winning all-MAC second team honors last year as a junior; Bruce Nederveld, senior linebacker from Livonia Bentley was rated the most improved player on the squad in the spring; flanker Keith Armstrong, of Livonia Churchill, is on the second offensive unit; and sophomore guard Rick Palmer, 245 pounder from Garden City East, is making a strong bid for an offensive berth.

Western also lists the rough and tough Weinberger twins, Garry and Larry of Southfield Lathrup, among the top candidates.

Followers of North Farmington High football fortunes will be watching the Fighting Irish of Notre Dame and the Illini of the University of Illinois to see how two of the greatest players ever turned out by Coach Ron Holland do in their collegiate debuts.

DREW MIHALIC, everybody's choice as footballer of the year when he quarterbacked the Raiders to a state championship, will be making his first appearance for the Irish.

Reports from South Bend indicate he has been shifted to a linebacker position where he is highly rated as a sophomore.

At Illinois, Mike Gow, who sparkled for the Illini frost last fall with his ball carrying and runbacks of punts and kickoffs, will move back to defense as a safety. Mike, a sophomore, is considered one of the fastest men on the squad.

The three are Jerry Oljace and Evan Smith of Churchill and Dan Ryscamp of Franklin.

MARTY BANKS, a three sport star at John Glenn, is a candidate for a tackle spot at Penn.

Chris Lang, formerly of Franklin, is in his third year as a linebacker at Augustana College in Sioux Falls, S. Dakota.



At Northern Michigan, Jeff Kind, of John Glenn, is in the race for the split side halfback spot. Kind, a junior, is battling Gary Herring, of Ohio, and Paul Cuccinotto, of Illinois, for the starting role.
