

Campaign Funds How Much Did Local Campaigners Spend?

said when Oppertbauer listed the "method of selling" as one reason why he was against the license.

Fregelle also said the disclosure of expenses was "a matter of ethics, but refrained their contributions," which brought the rebuttal from Oppertbauer that the disclosures were required by law.

Teeples' expense reports included a complete listing of ticket sales to a fund raising dinner, which are not required under the campaign expense disclosure law.

Teeples expense report listed contributions totaling \$2,390, including \$300 from a campaign fund - raising party at which ticket sales totaled \$1,600.

**FOLLOWING OP-
PERTBAUER'S** charges, a motion to table the request for a full board failed on a 3-3 vote, with Oppertbauer, Mrs. Schaffer and Cairns supporting the tabling.

A long moment of silence followed, broken by a debate on who should make the next motion.

Teeples asked Attorney J.T. Brennan whether it would be proper to make the motion. When told it was not, Trustee David Stader said he would make "a positive motion, to get it off dead center."

The deciding "vote," which was not a vote, was caused by the abstention of Cairns. He explained he had voted to table the motion, so did not feel he could vote on it.

Stader said, "I don't like to be in this position."

"We are getting far from the issue of the restaurant in this matter."

"I have said all along this is the kind of operation we should try to get it we are going to give anyone a liquor license."

WHILE MRS. Schaffer and Oppertbauer both said they voted against the license because there were already too many licenses on Orchard Lake Rd., most of the discussion drifted back to the charges of "selling methods."

These apparently included phone calls and letters from friends of the backers to township board members and one free meal ticket to the Starboard Tack to give the board a chance to view the operation.

"While we have had letters before, we've never had so many," Cairns said. "I'm sorry if I sold too hard," Fregelle said. "We have something good to add to this community."

AT THE END of the meeting, after the license debate was over, Stader attacked Teeples as head of the personnel committee for not meeting to discuss Stader's proposed ordinance on ethics.

"But you should have abstained from voting on the license. You even tried to make the motion for the license."

Teeples said he would "get the boys together" on a matter of ethics, but refrained their contributions, which brought the rebuttal from Oppertbauer that the disclosures were required by law.
