Tool Co. Leaves Farmington

FARMINGTON Arrowsmith Tool and Die, Inc. will move from the site on Grand River and Orchard Lake Rd. It has occupied for 22 years to a new location in Southfield, according to Donald Greenbury, president.

The new facility was purchased from Indianhead Corp., and was until recently occupied by Bratton Tool and Die Co.

Paul J. Dietz, vice president of the Hartman Group, Inc., who handled the sale of the Indianhead facility, said Arrowsmith's move was prompted by the necessity to use the Grand River building in a more economical manner.

"Industrial is not the highest and best use," he said. "Property on this corner would be much more economically used for commercial purposes."

The Grand River facility will be offered for rent after renovation expected to begin in November, Dietz said.

Poster Contest Has 3 Winners

FARMINGTON Three Farmington young people have qualified for statewide competition in a poster contest on poison prevention.

The local winners are Russell Franchi, 6, of 30983 Clubhouse Lane; Laura Gabel, 9, of 34095 Glouster; and Robert Carlo Jr., 13, of 32948 Baintree Road.

Each received a \$15 prize and qualified for one of three \$100 prizes to be awarded in statewide finals. Local winners were selected from 23 Michigan cities.

More than 125 posters were submitted in the local contest, sponsored by Arnold Pharmacies. "All these children showed an impressive understanding

of the dangers of home poisoning," commented James Oberstein, store manager. "That has made the whole project worthwhile."

"We hope parents got the message, also," Oberstein added.

"More than 600,000 cases of accidental poisoning were reported last year in the

United States, and three quarters of them involved children under five. That's why education in poison prevention is so essential."

Judges for the Farmington contest were Haroune Alameddine, science teacher, and Mrs. Fayanne Kaufman, art teacher, both at O.E. Dunkel Junior High.

Killer Sentenced

Lester Burmeister, 35, of Farmington Township, was sentenced from 10 to 20 years in Jackson Prison for the May 7 killing of a Livonia woman.

Sentence was pronounced Wednesday by Wayne County Circuit Judge Charles Kaufman. Burmeister had pleaded guilty to second degree murder before Judge Kaufman on Sept. 6.

BURMEISTER, who lived at 3734 McKinley in Farmington Township, owned a gasoline station at Nine Mile and Beach Daily in Southfield. Burmeister pleaded guilty to murdering his mother-in-law, Mrs. Ruth Downs of 31741 Bretton, Livonia. He also was charged with wounding his estranged wife, Judy; her father, Gilbert Downs; and James Rudnicki, a friend of Mrs. Burmeister.

Following a two-day man hunt by Livonia police, Burmeister was arrested May 9 by state police as he sat in a restaurant in West Branch. Livonia police had received information that the suspect owned a cottage in that area. They notified state police who spotted his car in front of the restaurant, entered, and made the arrest.

The shooting occurred at approximately 3:15 a.m. at the Livonia home where Burmeister was waiting for Mrs. Burmeister and Rudnicki to return.

AS THE COUPLE approached, the police report of the incident stated, they spotted a man with a rifle. They ran into the house and chained the front door.

According to Livonia Detective Sgt. Norman Meaders, six shots were fired through the front door, one hitting Mrs. Downs in the head.

Mrs. Burmeister was hit, according to Rudnicki, as she crouched behind a cupboard in the kitchen while telephoning police. Shots were fired through the back door, hitting her in the face.

Both Rudnicki and Downs were wounded, treated at the hospital and released. Mrs. Burmeister has undergone extensive surgery.

Hit Run Suspect Apprehended

A Farmington man is free on \$1,000 bond awaiting pretrial examination Oct. 10, charged with leaving the scene of an injury accident in Redford Township Wednesday afternoon.

Daniel Edward Paulson, 19, of 28210 Eight Mile Rd. is charged with hitting Wendee Valentine Uxa, 5, who was on

the front lawn of her home at 20418 Lexington. She was taken to Botsford Hospital. Police gave this account: Paulson had been involved in an accident at Grand River

and Inkster Wednesday afternoon. He is reported to have left that scene, came off Eight Mile Rd. "at a high rate of speed," and went up on the lawn where the girl was.

Police say, Paulson immediately backed off the lawn and sped away without identifying himself.
