



Father, Son To Star In Redford Concert

Young Brian Moon will be ably assisted by his father, Henry Moon, when he is featured in a trumpet solo at the Redford Civic Symphony's first concert of the season Sunday.

The event will take place at 4 p.m. in the gymnasium of Redford Union High School, Kinloch and Curtis, Redford Township.

Brian, who is in the 11th grade at Stevenson High School, Livonia, will play Trumpet Concerto by Joseph Haydn. For this selection, his father will take over the baton from the symphony's regular conductor, John Gajec.

Mrs. Smith is membership chairman of the Redford Township Music Society, sponsor of the four-concert season of the symphony. Members are invited to bring friends. They will be admitted on their host's membership cards.

Gajec will conduct the symphony in a varied program, opening the first half with "March Militaire Francaise" from Saint-Saens' "Algerian Suite," and the second half with "Dance Macabre," a symphonic poem by the same composer. Minota Pollock will play the violin solo for this.

He has been a member of the Livonia Youth Symphony for five years.

In 1971, he studied at the Schoolcraft College Summer Music School. This past summer, he spent eight weeks playing in the Berkshire Music Festival Youth Artist Orchestra at Tanglewood in Lenox, Mass.

When he returned home, he played his second year with the Michigan State Fair Honors Band. Last fall and spring, he performed with the Detroit Youth Orchestra and Dearborn Community Theater Orchestra in a musical.

At Stevenson, he plays in the wind ensemble, the orchestra and the stage band.

His father, who is also a busy trumpet player, teaches in the Livonia public schools. The symphony's second concert will be on Dec. 17 with

the Ford Chorus as guest artists. Linda Banford will play a flute solo.

The music society is also working on arrangements to sponsor a concert by the Australian child prodigy, pianist Rita Reichman. This will be at 8:30 p.m., Saturday, Nov. 4, in the Masonic Auditorium, Detroit. Tickets are now on sale at the auditorium box office, Grinnell and Hudson's.

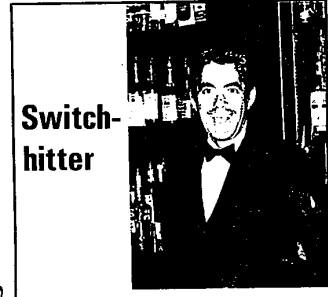
