Welfare swung her over to another of her favorite topics, women's rights, when she said: "Why does the system say to a young girl you can have a baby if you want to and not get married, and we will support it?"
"It's because men weren't going to support other able-bodied men."
A MAJOR prediction for next year came when she said the Ways and Means will be looking at tax laws.
Capital gains laws are particularly likely for reform, by increasing the holding period beyond the present six months, and increasing the rate, she said.
"This should drive out the gamblers," she said, but predicted Wall Street would be particularly unhappy.
"The biggest tax loophole is interest," she said.
"The trouble is that the biggest beneficiaries of the interest loophole are homeowners deducting interest paid on their mortgages."
"Even though most of those who are very wealthy and don't pay any tax at all use interest as a loophole, if it was changed I would have 600,000 homeowners in my district on my back."

As for the inevitable question about Ralph Nader's investigation of Congress she said, "I think anybody should feel free to investigate Congress, but I think that study was done too rapidly."
