

Aldersgate Sets Dedication

Aldersgate United Methodist Church, established in Redford Township 28 years ago, will dedicate its sanctuary at 10000 Beech in services at 9:30 and 11 a.m. Sunday, Oct. 22.

Bishop Dwight E. Loder of the Michigan area UMC will officiate for the dedication. Such a service in the United Methodist Church means that there is no further debt on the property.

The sanctuary was consecrated in 1959 by Bishop Marshall R. Reed, and an educational unit was opened formally in 1964.

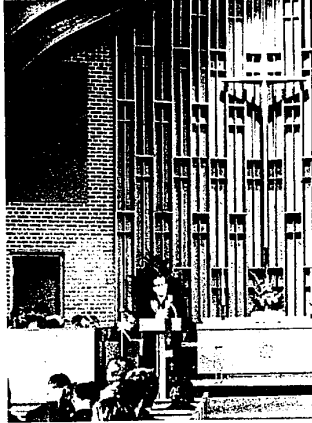
THE CHURCH facilities now are valued at more than \$950,000, including a three-manual pipe organ installed in 1965, and final payments were made this year.

Aldersgate, established as one of the first churches in the Redford area, now has grown to a membership of approximately 1,900 persons.

THE FIRST worship services were held in a small frame church located at Inkster and West Chicago. After it was destroyed by fire, the present property was purchased and the first unit, now the chapel, was consecrated by Bishop Reed in 1949.

The Rev. William G. Wager has been pastor of Aldersgate since 1966, and the Rev. William Smith joined him as associate pastor two years later.

Former members and friends are invited to share in the dedication.

Teens function best, believes a young man now heading a Campus Life movement in Livonia, if they balance their lives with attention in four areas: physical, the mental, the social and the spiritual.

"We've found all over the world," Ray Harwell said, "that most high school students have the funnest to go in the area of the spiritual."

The basis for the four-way emphasis by Campus Life, Harwell, comes from the gospel description of Jesus meeting in the temple with the elders and then returning home where "he grew in wisdom and in stature and in favor with God and man."

HARWELL, whose organization is affiliated with Youth for Christ and Voice of Christian Youth, has been working a year with students in Bentley and Stevenson High Schools.

"We have two basic goals," he said. "One is to reach the kids who don't know Christ and introduce him as a personal savior."

Hosts Lunch

The United Methodist Women of Lola Valley United Methodist Church are sponsoring "Luncheon Is Served" at 12 noon, Tuesday, Oct. 24. The church is located at Puritan and Delaware, Redford Township.

"Luncheon" is a meal put on to advertise new foods on the market. A talk is given afterwards on what was served and how to prepare it.

"The other is to work with young people who are Christians and help them to mature and develop to a point where they can reach fellow students."

In each school where a Campus Life ministry is being established, Harwell said, he talks to the principal to "explain what we're doing and establish a working relationship with the school."

"The reception has been good," he said. "At Stevenson, Jay Forstman said we were the best thing that had happened to the school."

UNDER HARWELL'S leadership, there now are Campus Life meetings every two weeks in the homes of Stevenson and Bentley students.

"These are basically evangelistic and for all kinds of kids," Harwell said. "We have games to break the ice, then some discussion on a given topic. We give the kids a chance to express their opinions, and then I try to wrap it up at the end of a meeting."

On alternate weeks, he said, Campus Life sponsors insight meetings, also in homes, for Christian students who want to study the Bible closely and apply its teaching to everyday life and problems.

An attractive magazine called "Campus Life," published by Youth for Christ International, is used as text for the student meetings.

LARGER EVENTS several times a year also are part of the program.

The next major one will be sponsoring a Halloween "Screen in the Dark" haunted house in an old house on Six Mile between Haggerty and Newburgh.

"The State Highway Department has given us permission to fix it up for this fund-raiser," Harwell said. The ministry also will sponsor a Nov. 4 assembly in Stevenson and occasionally brings Christian rock groups

and other musicians to the area.

There are occasional retreats for interested students and a delegation will go to Niagara Falls Dec. 27 to 30 for a Youth for Christ Holiday Teen Convention.

Harwell's headquarters for the Campus Life ministry are located at 14900 McNichols, Detroit. He hopes in the next few years to expand to several more high schools in the area.

ACCORDING to the most recent United Nations statistics, four out of five children in developing countries receive no medical care, three out of four suffer from malnutrition and half receive no schooling or must leave school before finishing primary grades.

A 10-cent contribution to UNICEF buys medicine to cure one child of trachoma, 50 cents buys enough vaccine to protect 40 children against tuberculosis, \$1 buys 50 cakes of soap or a satchel for a health center and \$5 buys a set of garden tools for a school nutrition program.

UNICEF was created in 1946 by the United Nations to aid young victims of World War II, and its program gradually shifted to meet long-range needs of the young.

The agency helps governments plan and initiate programs to meet the most pressing needs of children. Specific UNICEF-supported programs now include health,

education, pre-vocational training, nutrition, family and child welfare programs and emergency aid.
