

Community Center Plans Ski Trips

FARMINGTON is an additional \$2.50 charge for equipment rental. The Farmington Community Center is sponsoring a number of ski outings for the upcoming winter season including trips to Mount Brighton and the Village Inn area: Boyne Mountain, Boyne Highlands, Wallons Hills, Thunder Mountain, and Nubs Nob.

If there is enough interest among experienced skiers, bus trips to other areas such as Pine Knob, Mount Holly or Alpine may be planned.

Trips to Mount Brighton have been scheduled for Dec. 2 and 9, Jan. 6, 13, 20 and 27, Feb. 3, 10, 17, 24 and possibly March 3 depending on the response and weather.

THE TOTAL cost for a day at Mount Brighton, including the bus will be \$10. This will include all taxes and lessons, chairlifts and bus trip. There

is an additional \$2.50 charge for equipment rental.

The bus will leave the center for Mount Brighton at 8:30 a.m. in order to take full advantage of the \$6 ski ticket which entitles skiers to the use of the slopes from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

There are three trips scheduled for the Village Inn, Wallons Lake for senior high school students and two for junior high school students. From Dec. 26 through the 29 there will be a senior high three-day vacation trip. The \$82 charge includes bus with two or more accompanying adults, breakfast and dinners at the inn, heated swimming pool, dance band, and lift tickets for three days.

The charge does not include snacks en route, midday lunch at ski areas, or rental of ski equipment.

There will be another senior high trip to the Village Inn area on Jan. 12 through the 14. The \$55 cost includes bus, snacks on arrival at the inn Friday night, breakfast and dinner Saturday, use of heated pool and dance party Saturday night, breakfast Sunday, and lift tickets for two days.

The charge does not include snacks on route, lunches on the slopes or rental of ski equipment.

Following the same format will be a junior high weekend trip, Jan. 19 to 21, a senior high trip, Feb. 16 through 18 and a junior high trip, March 2 through 4.

Skiers interested in the proposed over night trips should contact the center for details and proper registration forms. Deposits must be paid in advance.

Those interested in the Saturday ski bus should also sign up. Reservations may be made for individual Saturday.
